Cherry Fruit Flies Need Dose of Spray

Cherry fruit flies were found emerging in cages in the earlier locations near Salem on June 5. All varieties of cherries as well as interplanted shrubs or brush along fence rows near cherry trees should be sprayed at once. Repeat the sprays after heavy showers or rains.

The following materials should be used in the spray: arsenate of lead, 1/2 pound; molasses, 2 quarts; water enough to make 10 gallons.
