This certificate, which brings national recognition to Miss Frazier is given by Better Homes and Gardens only to distinguished recipes which pass its Tasting-Test Kitchen's high standards for dependability, excellence of taste, and family usefulness.

Miss Frazier's endorsed recipe follows:

Broiled Mackerel—New England Style
Salt mackerel fillets
Butter
Pepper
Tomato ketchup
Parsley
Water
Hard-cooked eggs, sliced.

Freshen the fish by placing it in cold water and allowing it to remain there for at least 10 hours. Wipe the fish dry and lay on a broiler frame. First broil it to a nice brown on the flesh side, then turn and broil the other side. After broiling, spread lightly with butter and sprinkle with pepper to suit taste. Serve fish side up on a platter. Pour a little ketchup over each fillet, garnish with parsley, water and make a ring of sliced hard-cooked egg all around on the edge of the platter. Serve at once.

The above recipe was given to me by the wife of a New England fisherman. The original recipe called for white sauce to be poured over the fish, but I substituted the tomato ketchup since my family prefer it.

MOTORING HINTS
Radio Interference
Radio experts report that static, or electrical interference, sometimes develops in a car radio as a result of certain parts of the car, other than the spark plugs, accumulating charges of electricity, according to the Oregon State Motor association.

Use of Rubber
The motor vehicle industry in the United States last year consumed 885 million pounds of crude rubber, according to figures in a report received by the Oregon State Motor association.

Clogged Muffler
A clogged muffler will cause the engine of an automobile to overheat, according to the emergency road service of the Oregon State Motor association. Cleaning requires little time.

Test Spark Plugs
A spark plug that is not firing properly will fail to produce correct combustion in the gas chamber, says the Oregon State Motor association. Plugs should be cleaned at regular intervals.

Ignition Points
When ignition breaker points burn away rapidly it may be a sign that the condenser is defective, according to the emergency road service of the Oregon State Motor association. A skilled mechanic can check on this in short order.
