

Kitchen Sink Loot in Theft

Metzger Vandals Take Wire from Light Poles

Someone stole the kitchen sink, cupboard doors, small tools and lighting wire from the residence of J. Spreizer of Metzger during the owner's absence on the night of May 24, according to a report filed with Sheriff John Connell this week. Friday night the lighting wires at the Metzger school house were stolen, another report said.

Sam Cummings of Gales Creek reported this week that thieves removed two wheels and tires from his trailer at his home above the fish hatchery on Clear creek.

Theft of a drag saw last March from Wallace Reid of Shady Brook was cleared up last week when a deputy sheriff arrested Charles A. Daniels and Joseph L. Ferris in a woods camp in Columbia county near the Multnomah county line. The pair are said to have admitted the theft. Reid identified the saw by means of numbers on the magneto and repairs which he had made. The two had remodeled the machine and removed the numbers from the motor, according to the officers.

Clarence Geiger was arrested at Seghers Junction, near Gaston, Friday for trespass. It is charged that he was marking carloads of lumber destined for outside points.

Four transients, said to be berry pickers, fell into the hands of the law Friday and Saturday. James J. Kelly and John Koehler, both

Sour cream adds to the food value of any dish. Its rich texture gives a smoothness that no other liquid produces and its acid content acts as a leavening agent. In fact, sour cream should be looked upon as a "find" rather than an annoyance.

Save your sour cream and use it in preparing the desserts listed below.

Sour Cream Pie
1 cup sour cream
1 cup brown sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2-teaspoon soda
1 cup dates
3 egg yolks
Pinch of salt
1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix and cook about 10 minutes. Add soda and when bubbly put into an unbaked pie shell. Bake 20 minutes at 450 degrees. Cover with meringue and bake 30 minutes at 300 degrees.

Old-Fashioned Gingerbread
2 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
1/2-teaspoon baking power
1/2-teaspoon salt
1 egg
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup light molasses
1 cup sour cream
1/4 cup water
1/2 cup finely cut preserved ginger

Sift flour, measure, and sift again with soda, baking powder, and salt. Beat egg, add sugar and molasses; and stir in sour cream and water. Combine thoroughly with dry ingredients; add preserved ginger; and bake in well greased square pan in moderate oven (350 degrees) about 40 minutes or until done. Serves 9 to 12.

Whole Wheat Flour Cake
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup sugar
1 egg, well beaten
1/2 cup seedless raisins
1/2 cup sour cream
1 cup whole wheat flour
2 tablespoons white flour
1/2 teaspoon soda
Salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon or mace.
Cream butter; add sugar and the egg well beaten. Add sifted dry ingredients to the first mixture alternately with the sour cream. Bake in oven (350 degrees) for 40 minutes.

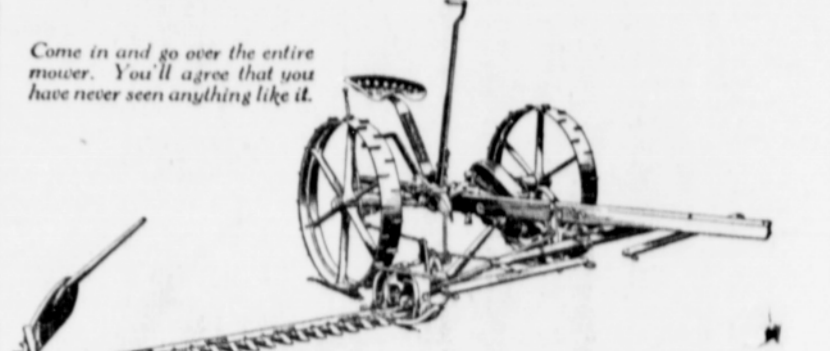
