

Hillsboro Host to Sherwood Sunday

Second Half Schedule On

Last Sunday's Games Postponed Account Rain

Second half play in the Eastern and Western Sunset leagues will open Sunday with games as originally scheduled for May 31. Last Sunday's games were all postponed on account of rain and will be played later, according to announcement, as will the games at first scheduled to open the last half.

Hillsboro Smoke-Eaters will open the second half of the Eastern Sunset here Sunday when they play hosts to the powerful Sherwood team.

Sherwood lost only two games the first half, one to Willamette by a 4 to 3 score and one to Hillsboro by a 3 to 1 score. Hillsboro lost one game to Garden Home and by virtue of Willamette being given the game which they lost to Orenco two weeks ago, due to Orenco using ineligible players,

the first half ended in a tie between Willamette and Hillsboro.

This tie was to have been played last week but was called off on account of rain and will be played at some later date, not yet decided upon.

The last game between Sherwood and Hillsboro turned out to be a real old-fashioned pitchers' battle between Johnny Harkins, an ex-Coast leaguer, and Ted Rosky, Hillsboro's fire-ball king. Hillsboro managed to break an eight-inning 1 to 1 tie to push over two runs, which proved to be the winning margin. The fans are promised a real treat Sunday when these two top teams clash, as the last game certainly was a thriller.

Hillsboro's crimples, Oakes and Joss, are almost back in shape again and may see action Sunday for the first time in five weeks. Oakes' ankle is almost well and Bill Joss' broken finger is healing rapidly. Dick Sutherland is now back from school and will give Hillsboro a little added hitting power.

Other Eastern Sunset games for Sunday are as follows: Aloha at Garden Home, Willamette at Newberg, Tualatin at Orenco.

Cornelius, which maintained an unbeaten record for the first half in the Western Sunset, will be host to North Plains Sunday. Other games are: Scappoose at Banks; Seaside at Seaside Island; Twin Oaks at Verboort.

Pheasant Chicks Get Farm Homes

Eight hundred pheasant chicks were distributed this week to 25 Washington county farmers for raising and liberating this summer to replenish the game of this section, according to Donald T. Templeton, county judge.

The birds were hatched in Hughes hatchery, from 1900 eggs procured here from the game farms. In addition the game commission usually liberates a number of birds from the game farms.

Farmers taking the chicks for raising are given feeding instructions, but receive no compensation except the knowledge of where the birds were liberated and the hunting possibilities when the season opens.
