Locals Defeat Sherwood 4-1

Two Eastern Sunset Games Washed Out by Showers

Only two of the opening games in the second half of the Eastern Sunset league were played Sunday afternoon, due to heavy showers, while soaked fields made playing impossible. Hillsboro won a sensational victory over Sherwood 4 to 1, while Tualatin trimmed Ore-

The Aloha-Garden Home clash, as well as the game between Newberg and Willamette were washed out.

Tualatin turned in four homers, a triple and seven doubles in trouncing Oreco.

The Hillsboro Smoke-Eaters will play Willamette here Sunday for the championship of the first half of the eastern division of the Sunset league. This game was twice rained out, but will be played Sunday if at all possible. Sunday's game was originally scheduled at Willamette in a second half game, but the managers got together and decided to play off the first half tie Sunday at Hillsboro and postpone the second half game to a later date.

Kollermeier, Willamette's ace, has won 5 and lost 1 this year, while Kollermeier will probably get the starting assignment as Hillsboro has beaten two left-handers so far this year.

Willamette and Hillsboro have probably the two best performing infields in the league and both teams have fine batteries and good outfielders, so a battle royal should be on tap Sunday.

The Smoke-Eaters gained a strange hold on the second half Sunday when they needed out Sherwood 4 to 1 after trailing the visitors 1 to 0 for seven innings. Sherwood is rated as one of the four best teams in the league and Hillsboro was fortunate in getting a win chalked up over this fine team Sunday.

After five innings of shutout ball, Hillsboro suddenly came to life in the sixth to fill the bases on an error, a hit and a walk. With one out and rain threatening to break up the game, Hillsboro made a game effort to tie up the score before the game could be called off on account of rain. A squeeze play was called but went wrong when the signal was missed as Hoag laid down a sacrifice bunt. Hanna flew out to end the inning and stopped Hillsboro's rally cold. In the seventh things really began to happen. Rosky, first man up, went out; Joss singled and stole second. Heinrich was hit by a pitched ball and Hoag walked, filling the bases with only one out. Hanna drove a hot one down first base, but Cereghino made a spectacular catch which he almost turned into a double play, but all the runners wisely held their bases. Spattuck, Hillsboro's most dependable hitter, came to bat and cracked out a scorching double which scored Joss and Heinrich. Davis drew a walk, again filling the bases. In an attempt to catch Davis off, first baseman threw high and Hoag watching his chance ran home while Spattuck rounded third and slid home safely as Cereghino held the ball too long before throwing to the plate. Hillsboro was then leading 4 to 1 after Rosky hurled shutout ball the next two innings to hold on to the lead. Sherwood put over their lone tally in the first inning on a hit, a sacrifice and a double. Rosky pitched eight innings of shutout ball from the first inning on. He allowed but five hits and struck out 10. Podbellian allowed six hits and also walked 10, but wildness was mainly responsible for his defeat.

Hillsboro will play this same

team here in the feature game July 4th for the "Happy Days" celebration. Both games this year have been nip and tuck affairs as Hillsboro squeaked out a 3 to 1 win the first half in an eighth inning rally. Mickey Davis, Hillsboro's diminutive second baseman, made a spectacular stop of a hard hit grounder way back of first base, which he would have turned into a put-out had not Rosky dropped the throw to first when the baserunner collided with him. Frank Heinrich, Spattuck, Davis and Hoag, the Hillsboro infield combination, played stellar ball, while Hillsboro's original outfield combination of Hanna, Oakes and Joss also repeated all chances in the outer garden. Oakes and Joss appeared in the lineup for the first time in five weeks, due to injuries, but will be available to take their regular turn along with Hanna and Spattuck. Rotary Would Buy Pulmotor

Seek Co-operation of Other Local Organizations

With two drownings in Hillsboro in recent weeks, the Hillsboro Rotary club, at the annual meeting Tuesday night of the board of directors, appropriated \$125 to be used in the purchase of a pulmotor for Hillsboro, providing the remainder of the \$25 estimated at \$75 to \$90, can be raised by other organizations.

The directors were of the opinion that if Hillsboro owned a pulmotor, at least one life could have been saved in the recent drownings, and possibly two. The board points out that the small cost of the machine is slight in comparison to the saving of one life.

The board also appropriated \$200 to be used as a student loan fund for juniors and seniors. Another appropriation was \$25 for the purchase of tennis nets for the proposed city tennis courts providing the courts are constructed.

The meeting was in the home of C. T. Richardson, where the board members were dinner guests.

Relief Committee Grants Assistance

Twenty-five persons were granted old age assistance at a meeting of the county relief committee in the court house Tuesday evening. Ten other cases were turned back for reconsideration and six were refused. There are 314 persons on the assistance rolls at the present time. Alice Maxwell, executive secretary, said.

Under a new ruling put into effect following an opinion by the attorney general, applicants for assistance now will be compelled to give mortgages to the relief committee on any real property owned. The pledges are for the purpose of assuring repayment when and if the persons become able to pay back assistance received.

The staff of the relief office has been cut from seven to five persons for the summer, including one case worker and one clerk.
