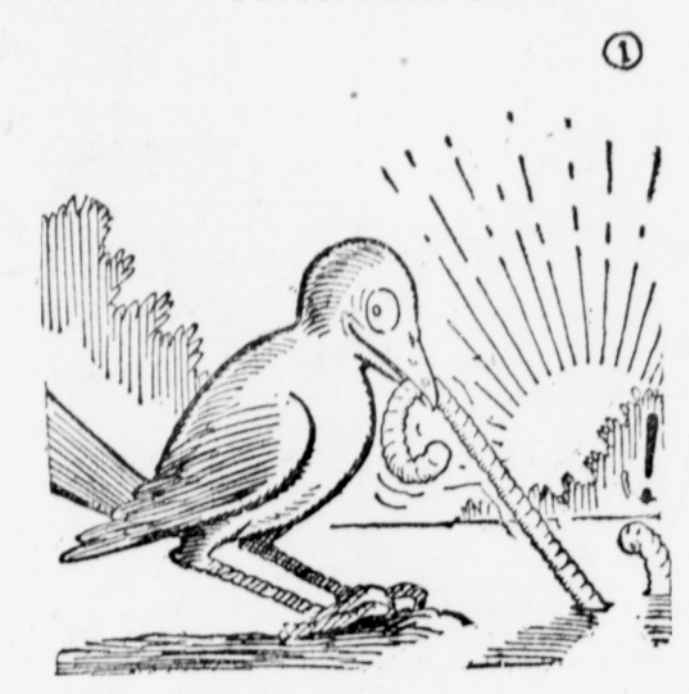

Death Rate Low SAN FRANCISCO—The lowest alcohol death rate since 1921 was recorded in 1935, the second full year since repeal of national prohibition. The 1935 death rate from this cause was two per 100,000, which marks a decline of 13 per cent in deaths from alcoholism among insured wage-earners, as seen in the life insurance company statistics, according to Metropolitan Life Insurance statisticians.

Chehalis Resident Buried Saturday

Funeral Services Held at Newberg

CHEHALEM MOUNTAIN—John Davis, 61, died June 10 at Wilcox hospital in Newberg. He had been bedfast more than two years, following a broken hip. He suffered a paralytic stroke April 16 from which he did not recover.

John Vestal Davis, son of Ira W. and Nancy Davis, was born in Henry county, Indiana, November 25, 1855. He lived in northwest Iowa for a number of years and came to Oregon in 1907, settling on Chehalis Mountain, where he had since resided.

He was married in 1921 to Mrs. Effie Cady McPherson, who survives him. He also leaves a step-daughter, Miss Mildred McPherson, one sister, Mrs. Hettie Brunskill of South Dakota, four brothers, Joseph of Prussia, S. D., Jake and W. R. of Chehalis Mountain, and Sylvester of Dilliey; three nephews and one niece.

Funeral services were held at Laurel Saturday afternoon and interment was in Mount Olive cemetery, William Morse of Newberg officiated.
