Board Orders Uniform Price

Standard Retail Prices in All Oregon Established Oregon milk control board, meet-ing with 79 milk distributors in Portland Monday, ordered standard retail prices for milk in all sections

of Oregon, calling for the same 11-cents-a-quart figure for 4 per cent milk that Portland and Salem users have paid since February 1.
