Person, vice-president of the Washington Savings & Loan association and the Tualatin Valley Federal Savings & Loan association of Hillsboro. This loan record places the Oregon savings groups in second place in the nation in a comparison made in Washington, D. C., with similar nstitutions in all states, Person Of the total of \$670.450 loaned in Oregon under the Federal housing plan, savings and loan associations

loaned \$418,700. More than half the insured loans credited to Oregon association have been made since the first of the present year and amount to \$224,550, according to the Washington survey. The survey also disclosed that Oregon associations have made 35 new construction loans for a total new construction loans for a total of \$126,200 or an average of \$3606 each

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
