

Judge Long Speaker Annual Pioneer Meet

Donald E. Long of Portland was the speaker at the annual picnic and reunion of the Pioneer and Native Sons and Daughters association Sunday at Shute park. He reviewed the early history of this county, beginning with the discovery of the Columbia river by Captain Gray in 1792 and called attention to the fact that 12 men who took a very active part in the organization of the provisional government at Champeo on May 1, 1843, were from what is now Washington county. The most outstanding of this group was the late Joseph Meek, father of Stephen Meek of near North Plains. On July 5 of the same year at Champeo, he continued, an executive committee of three was elected to take the place of a governor, with David Hill, the founder of Hillsboro, as chairman. He also recalled the fact that the first Baptist church on the Pacific coast was organized at West Union by David Lenox, and the first Congregational church was organized by Rev. J. S. Griffin near what is now North Plains in 1843.
