park. Donkey baseball, for those who have not witnessed the game, is one hilarious moment after another. Local teams will contend for honors astride the comical beasts. Dancing will conclude the program. Throughout the day there will be music by the Helvetia band.

July 3 promises to be nearly as gala an occasion as the climax July 4, opening with a parachute jump by Hopkins at increased altitude at 1:30 p.m., followed by the dedication exercises for the park.

For the dedication a special program is being prepared under the direction of a committee headed by Herb Staples. There will be speakers, music, flag presentation to the park committee of the city council and other numbers.

July 3 is also the day set for a Townsend club picnic with speakers, program and picnic dinner at noon. The main Townsend speaker will talk at 3 p.m.

For baseball fans, the Cornelius-North Plains mix at 2:45 p.m. promises to give plenty of excitement with the winning team to take the whole purse on a challenge.

Donkey baseball will be repeated under the flood lights at 7:30 p.m. followed by coronation of the Goddess of Liberty in Shute auditorium at 9 by Donald E. Long, former Hillsboro resident and prominent Portland attorney. Dancing will follow the ceremony. There also will be the usual free acts on the midway. Bethany band will furnish music all day.

#### Parade 9 o'clock

Celebration July 4 begins at 9 o'clock in the morning when the big parade forms downtown and begins the march to the park. Business houses have promised floats, fraternal and patriotic organizations will march or have floats in the parade, there will be costumed characters marching and a special section for children with their pets.

After the parade reaches the park, there will be a flag raising followed by patriotic exercises under the auspices of Hillsboro post American Legion, including a speaker, singing, music and patriotic pageant under the direction of Mrs. H. H. Stannard. This will close the morning program.

C. C. Carlson of Portland, president of the Young Democratic club of Oregon, will speak at the patriotic exercises morning July 4.

The afternoon will open with a ballet dance in the auditorium by Miss Helen Wick, Hillsboro dancing instructor. At 2 p.m. Hillsboro and Sherwood ball clubs will meet in the new ball park.

At 3 o'clock, George Hopkins will make his attempt to set a record altitude parachute jump, using either a smoke bomb or powder to mark his course through the sky before he is near enough to be visible to the spectators. He will jump from an altitude of more than 17,000 feet.

#### Fireworks in Evening

Crowning feature of the day will be the huge fireworks display at 9:30 o'clock. The display this year is said to be one of the largest, most varied and brilliant yet produced in Hillsboro.

Three bands will furnish music all day. They are from Bethany, Forest Grove and Sherwood.

This year visitors to the park will find better accommodations for family picnics, with more grass and shade available and better segregated from the crowds and midway. Rearrangement of the park during the spring and winter has placed the midway in the open space at the south end of the park, leaving the grass and trees around the borders of the park free to picnickers.

New driveways throughout the park, all surfaced with crushed rock, have removed the dust nuisance so apparent at other celebrations. The management feels this year that larger crowds can be handled with greater ease.

Prizes and divisions for the "big parade" July 4, as announced by the committee, follow:

Children with pets: \$10 in cash prizes, ticket to Venetian theatre and ticket for one ride at the grounds.

vision; \$21,439.04 for teaching and supplies; \$4373.36 for operation; \$2292.36 for maintenance and repair; \$14,567.77 for transportation and miscellaneous items; \$2280.57 for insurance covering a five-year period; \$603 for new furniture; \$1324.94 for street assessments in full; \$15,000 in bonds paid off; \$6,000 in loan warrants paid; \$5,499 in bond interest and \$1,095.11 in loan warrant interest.

The area within which Duplex apartments and hotels may be constructed lies along Lincoln street on both sides west to Bailey avenue and east of Baseline and North Range. On the east the limit is that half-block between Fifth and Sixth avenues and south to the city limits except the central business districts, industrial and local business areas.

Local business area is both sides of Baseline street one-half block on both sides from Fourth avenue to First avenue. This area also includes a half-block west of Tenth and a half-block west of Ninth and a half-block on each side of Baseline between these limits.

Central business district is that area which is bounded on the north by Lincoln and goes south to half a block south of Washington, and one-half block east of Fourth avenue west to railway tracks.

The industrial section is harder to define. Beginning at the west city limits, it includes all that territory adjacent to the Southern Pacific railway tracks from about a block on each side with the larger portion in the southwestern part of the city.

While industrial plants, business houses, hotels and rooming houses are prevented from entering the residential district, residences may be erected in any of the other districts.


