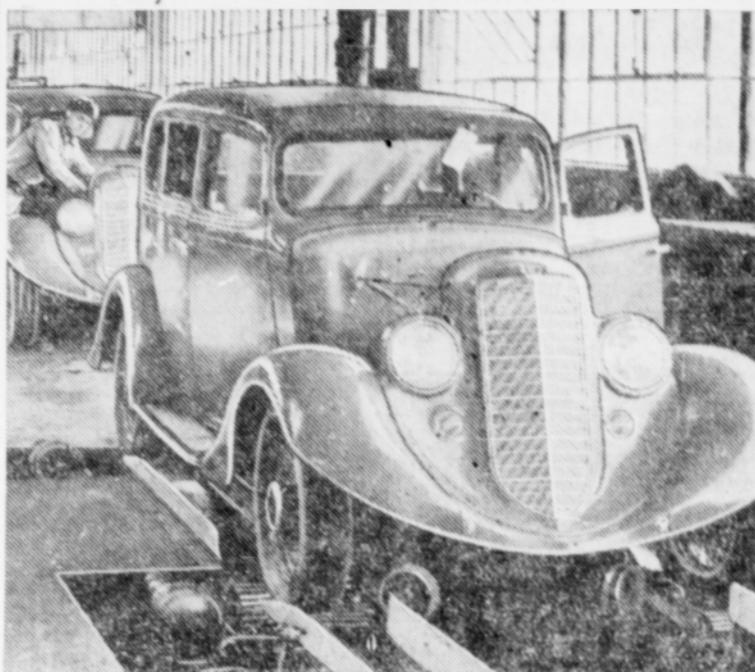

Sift the corn meal into the boiling milk. Stir constantly. When it is smooth and can be poured, remove from the fire and add the butter and salt. Cool and add beaten egg yolks and baking powder. Then add the stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in fairly hot oven until set and brown. Serve hot with a spoon.
