

Methodist Pastor to Take Gresham Charge

Rev. Charles M. Reed has been transferred to Gresham and Rev. Alexander Hawthorne, formerly of Clinton-Kelly Methodist church, Portland, will take the pastorate here and at Cornelius. Rev. Reed came here more than two years ago from Burley, Idaho, to relieve Rev. Leroy Walker and was returned here at two different conferences. He has also directed the Cornelius church. Conference was held last week at Corvallis.

Rev. Reed will preach the service at the church next Sunday morning and in the evening, which will be a union service at the Christian church. These union services will continue through the summer.

Rev. Alexander Hawthorne was pastor of the church next Sunday morning a number of years ago.

County Woman Tells of Trip

A letter of June 19, from Mrs. P. A. Qualls of Roy, who with her husband is visiting relatives at Powder Springs, Tenn., says in part:

"We came through some nice country and some that wasn't so nice. The weather was fine, except a storm in North Plains, Nebraska, and it was a bad one, with lots of wind, rain, thunder and lightning. The roads were in good condition all the way except a few places, where they were making new roads or repairing the old ones. We came through Idaho, Wyoming, Nebraska, Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky and Missouri and we are now in Tennessee. We stayed six days in Missouri and it was very hot there Sunday, June 14, and it has been hot here ever since. They have had no rains for so long that the ground is cracking. It looks like rain here today, but it hasn't done so as yet. Wyoming, Nebraska and Iowa were terribly windy places and rather hard driving on highway. We will be here three or four weeks if I don't get too homesick. Mr. Qualls' mother and dad, who are 81 years old, live here, besides sisters and brothers. We go from here to Indianapolis, Ind., my old home town.

Of all the places we came through there was none that could come up to good old Oregon. When we come home we plan on visiting Yellowstone park and Los Angeles, Cal., and any other place of interest we care to. We are having plenty of fried chicken and other good southern dishes. Mr. Qualls has already gained four pounds and I am afraid to get weighed.

If they don't get rain soon here they won't have any crops. I have been trying to find a cool place ever since I have been here in Tennessee, but the breeze is hot. I do hope it rains soon. I am as sunburned as an Indian, but I feel great."
