crashed granite wind in and out through the trees and about the new plantings of shrubbery.

Across the creek a stone foot bridge arches to give passage to a rock garden across which the path winds to terminate at the wading pool. The large open space just south of the auditorium, which continues to the railway tracks, has been leveled and made a permanent place for the carnival midway, giving this part of all celebrations larger space, and better locations.

By this shift, the trees along the north side of the park have been made available for picnic parties while the main grove has been made more accessible. More grass has been planted in all parts of the park and stray brush and poison oak have been grubbed out.

In addition to all of this work the firemen have purchased strong floodlights, which have been erected in various parts of the park and which will assure nearly daylight brilliance during the night celebrations.

Another change in the park has been the construction of a new baseball field, east of the main park and across the highway, leaving the old space available for future park development which may someday include a swimming pool.

During the celebration this year, the firemen will make every effort to see that visitors find comfortable locations for picnics and family gatherings, and the entire park will be patrolled during the festivities. Space has been provided for parking 5,000 automobiles with-

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
