Sewer Problems Solved by Loan

Property owners who lack the cash for connections to sewers in Hillsboro after the completion of the new sewer system, will find assistance through the Federal Housing Administration. Loans handled in Hillsboro at both the Commercial National and the First National banks.

Under these loans, any property owner making showing that he has sufficient income to make regular payments on his loan, will be able to obtain the \$75 or \$100 necessary to make the sewer connection, bank executives point out. The particular section of the Federal Housing loan act under which the loan will be granted, allows borrowing up to \$2000 on what virtually is a promissory note.

Hillsboro citizens soon will be faced with the necessity of making sewer connections where a connection to the sewer system has not heretofore been made, because of a city ordinance passed at the same time that the government PWA loan and grant was made.

This ordinance forbids any other sanitary arrangement within the sewer districts other than a connection to the sewer.

Local Highway Work Curtailed

State, Federal Employment Demands Pinch Budget

Early demands on the Washington county road budget, bringing the funds on hand to a low ebb, caused further curtailment of county road, bridge and quarry work it was announced Tuesday by J. W. Barney, county engineer. Necessary co-operation in state and federal re-employment efforts is pointed out as a contributing cause of the vanishing appropriations.

Work brought to a stop with this week includes Jackson quarry, where 13 men are employed, Durham quarry, which employs eight, and ten men from the bridge crews on new construction and repairs. All men were placed on call.

During the new month just starting, only grading work and small emergency projects will be continued, which will give employment to about six workmen, Barney said.
