will be an hour of hilarity when the Farmers' Union team plays a match with Fairway Market. During the whole evening the Helvetia band will play, and from 9 p. m. to 1 m. there will be dancing in the auditorium. Events will move at a faster tempo July 3, beginning with the Townsend picnic, which officially opens at 11 a. m. with a speech by John Weir of California. After the speech the club members will have picnic dinner under the trees on the picnic ground. During the afternoon George Hopkins will make his second jump from an airplane flying at 10,000 feet and at 2 o'clock there will be an official dedication of the park with speaking, presentation of a flag to the park committee of the city council, and music of the North Plains and Cornelius baseball clubs will play a challenge game at 1:30 o'clock in the new ball park and at 3 p. m. Willis Mahoney of Klamath Falls will address the Townsend picnic from the speakers stand at the edge of the big grove. Newly organized Men's Breakfast club of Hillsboro will meet an all-star team on the donkey baseball field at 7:30 for the amusement of the spectators and the exercise of the donkeys. Chief attraction of the evening will be the always popular coronation ball in the auditorium with the colorful coronation procession at 9 o'clock and the ceremony of placing the diadem on the head of "Goddess" Bernice while her court and the audience do her honor. Donald E. Long, former Portland municipal judge and native son of Hillsboro, will place the crown on the blonde head of the ruler of "Happy Days". After the ceremony everybody will dance until 1 a. m. Happy Days will reach a climax with the program of July 4, which begins with the big parade downtown at 9 o'clock in the morning. The parade arrives at the park with a flag raising by the Boy Scouts and the patriotic program in the auditorium under the direction of Hillsboro Post, American Legion. The daring trapeze performance of Raymond brothers, will thrill the crowd twice a day, once at 12:45 and again at 7 p. m. A special attraction in the auditorium will be the performance of Miss Helen Wick, ballet dancer and dance instructor in Hillsboro. At two o'clock in the afternoon, Hillsboro ball club will meet the last aggregation from Sherwood in the ball park. George Hopkins will make his last parachute jump at 3 p. m. from 17,000 feet altitude, and higher providing Ed Ball is able to climb his airplane to a greater height. Hopkins expects to carry flour to release at his highest altitude to mark his course downward until he becomes visible to the spectators. Hillsboro and Vernonia fire departments will struggle with demonstrations beginning at 7:30 o'clock in the evening, which will be followed by the fireworks at 9:30 o'clock. This year the fireworks display will be one of the most elaborate ever staged in Hillsboro with beautiful ground and aerial displays in greater quantity than ever before. Dancing in the auditorium will follow the fireworks while those that are interested may remain in the mid-way under the lights. Three bands will furnish music throughout the day and lend color to the parade in the morning. The bands are from Bethany, Sherwood and Forest Grove. For the children there will be the usual play apparatus and in addition a fine new wading pool just completed by a crew from WPA. 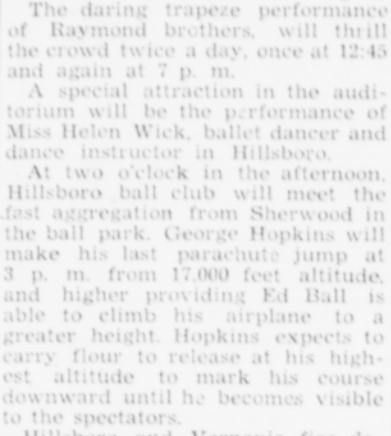
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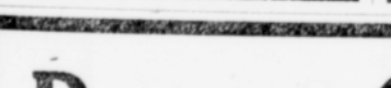

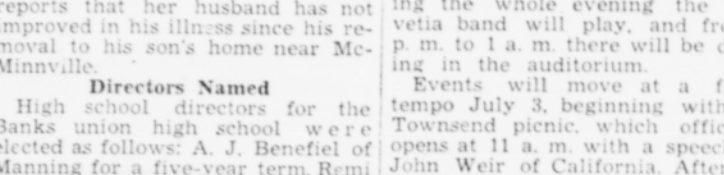
