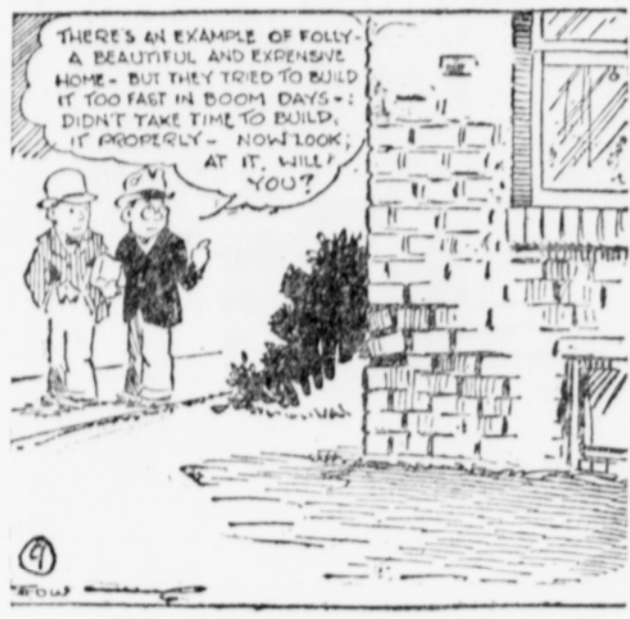

Orphan Railway Locomotive Offers Problem to Pennsylvania Attorney

When you own a railway locomotive and somebody has taken up the track it leaves one in somewhat of a quandary, according to W. F. DuBois, attorney from Coudersport, Pa., who finds himself thus hung on the horns of the proverbial dilemma.

"In our state," he said, "this stream would make some of the finest fishing in the country."

Pennsylvania, DuBois remarked, makes good use of its fish hatcheries with the result that fishing is fairly good throughout the state.

DuBois arrived here Thursday from the east to investigate the condition of the Haskett-Carpenter timber property above Cherry Grove in which he has an interest. The locomotive, former equipment on the railway from Cherry Grove to Gaston, was a part of the holdings of the company.

The locomotive, symbol, perhaps, of what was to have been, sits in a shed at Cherry Grove with the tracks torn up between that former promissory town and the outside world, making the locomotive a liability instead of an asset.

Years ago a large mill was constructed at Cherry Grove and a dam built in the river, but the dam burst and the mill burned while the timber remained on the hills to grow old awaiting exploitation. The Haskett-Carpenter company bought the timber with the idea of developing the mill and making Cherry Grove a thriving center, but like some of the mining towns, Cherry Grove now suns itself alone in the hills.

DuBois talks interestingly of Pennsylvania, though he likes Oregon and would not mind making his home here except that his law practice is in the east and he is getting to the age where he would not care to make another start.

Last winter Pennsylvania suffered with the cold and excessive snow. DuBois relates, and in the spring the most destructive floods in the history of the state did untold damage to towns, cities and rural communities, but the damage now is being repaired and things are about normal again.

"Of course we have the relief situation there," DuBois said. "Just about the same as you have it here. There is plenty of work, it seems to me, for those who would go to work, but relief has done something to these people."

The state, he relates, is heavily taxed to meet the state's half of the relief budget, the remainder being furnished by the federal government.

The sacrament of the Lord's Supper will be observed in the Reedville church next Sunday evening at 8 o'clock.

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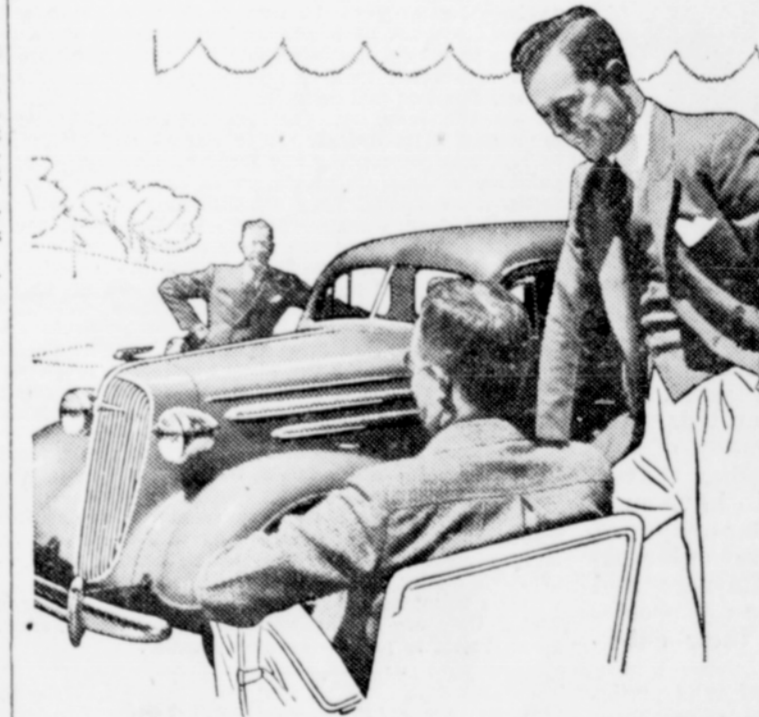
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
