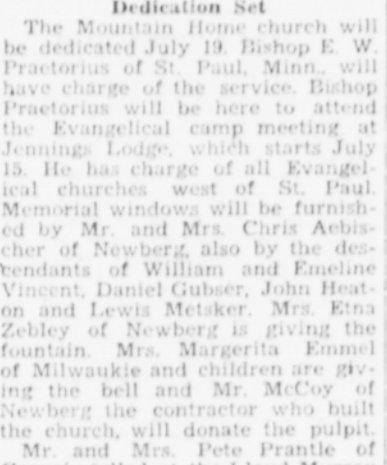

Atkinson is survived by his wife and two children, Donald and Alice. He had been employed on road building projects in Washington county.

Weir said that although he could not swim he jumped into the water to assist his friend, but that he was unable to do so and that after coming up twice Atkinson sank for the final time. Local firemen rushed a pulmotor to the scene, but the body was not recovered for nearly two hours, and they were too late. The body was located by State Police Officer Westcott and Deputy Fire Warden Steensen.

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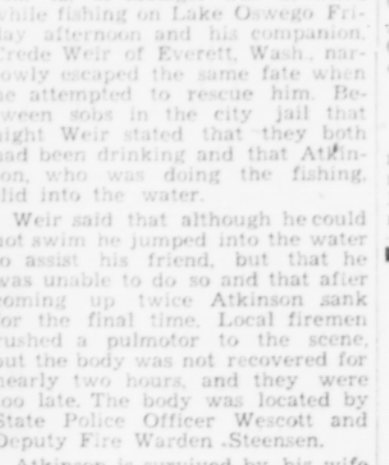
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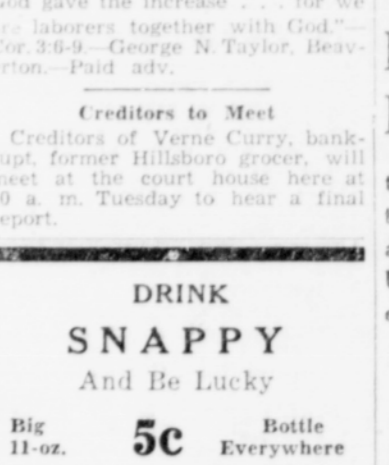
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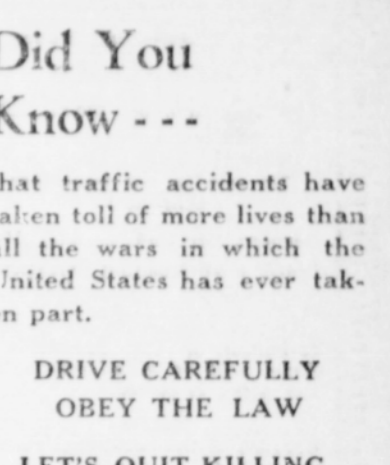
