

# Newberg Will Play Hillsboro Here

## Local Tossers Defeat Orenco

Game Here Sunday One of Last in Second Half

The Verboort-Cornelius game was played under protest from the seventh inning and the decision is to be left to the Portland umpires. The entire game still is in dispute awaiting settlement, it is said.

The Hillsboro nine ran roughshod over Orenco here Sunday and piled up a total of 12 runs while holding Orenco to 4, keeping Hillsboro on top in the second-half standings with three straight wins. Every man on the team participated in the hitting and scoring and, although the game was rather lopsided, the Hillsboro boys played fine ball and capitalized on all the breaks.

Hillsboro will play Newberg on the Hillsboro field Sunday in another Sunset League contest. This game will test the "Smoke Eaters" power to the limit as Newberg has a hard-clouting collection of players, who at present are leading the league in team batting. Although Rocky held the Newberg "Powerhouse" to a lone tally last game, he was in hot water from start to finish and only superb mound work in the penches kept Newberg from "straying" Hillsboro finally won out 6 to 1 but had to put over four runs in the eighth to clinch the victory. Hillsboro will also have to win to keep in the running the second half of this half. This will be Hillsboro's sixth home game in a row on account of rain, etc., getting the schedule all out of place so Hillsboro will have to take to the road three weeks in a row after Sunday's game to make up for it. This will be the final game of the second half on the Hillsboro field and all the fans are urged to turn out to give the "Smoke Eaters" a final send-off before taking the road for three hard games. Another game or two will probably be played in the playoff but as far as the second half regular season goes this will be the final appearance of the "Smoke Eaters" on their home grounds.

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## Locals Out of State Tourney

Extra-Inning Game Lost to Reliable Shoe Monday

Playing what the tournament officials judged the best game of the state championship elimination contests so far, the Hillsboro nine lost a thrilling, closely played, game to Reliable Shoe of the fast City League Monday night. Playing their usual heads-up, driving brand of ball that has put the "Smoke Eaters" at the top of their league, the Hillsboro boys redeemed themselves for the poor showing made in the tournament last week.

Hillsboro, not conceding an outside chance to hold the collection of heavy hitters assembled by the Shoemans to a low score, came near completely upsetting the apple cart and defeating the City League's entry. The Shoemans have twice defeated the strong Blitz-Weinhard nine this year and had the strong Salem nine in the run for eight innings last week.

Hillsboro was off to a good start when Davis, first man up, singled and Hoag walked. Heinrich sacrificed and both men scored as Sax made a bad throw to second to catch Hoag. Reliable Shoe added three runs in the sixth to take the lead as Sorenson playing in the "jinx" left field dropped a fly ball which Leverett scored on a bad throw by Messenger. For the next three innings Hillsboro had the winning run on second base with only one out, but couldn't hit in the penches to bring him home with the deciding tally. In the last half of the eleventh after two men were out and a Shoeman on first base, Johnny Bianco, ex-Oregon State footballer, patted on up against the center field fence which drove in the winning run.

This defeat eliminates the Hillsboro team from the tournament, but a great compliment was paid the "Smoke Eaters" when Verne Harrington, Blitz-Weinhard manager, remarked that the Hillsboro boys could beat any team entered in the tournament in a daylight contest but that no team, never having played under lights before, could be expected to come through a tough series of that kind. Statistics seem to bear this out as Hop God, Toledo, Blitz-Weinhard, Reliable Shoe, and Oak Grove have all played a lot of games under the lights and these teams are still in the running. Salem is the lone contender that has not had night game experience.

Gorman Leverett, Hillsboro's major-league hurler, stole the show as he gave a marvelous demonstration of pitching and kept the opposing batters handcuffed practically all the time. It was the better hitting of the opposition that meant the difference in the score as Hillsboro looked as good as dead as any team has looked in one of the tournament. Only costly misjudged fly balls kept Hillsboro from being right up there with the leading teams.

Lyle Oakes, Hanna and John Houck sparkled in the field, turning in some brilliant defensive work at crucial times. Hoag was the leading hitter with three hard smacks for four times up. Oakes, Shattuck and Davis also looked good at the plate. Bill Zeigler, sent in to pinch hit for Sorenson, connected with the first pitched ball which tied up the score and sent the game into the extra inning. Hillsboro can be mighty proud of the showing made by her ball team this year as it was the only purely amateur team that as much as won a game in the tournament. Every man on the Hillsboro roster saw action in one or more of the three games played.

The Hillsboro Smoke-Eaters lost their first game in the state tournament in Portland July 8 to Oak Grove who upset the powerful General Motors team the week previous. Practically the entire Hillsboro team suffered a bad case of the jitters and light trouble and never showed the least resemblance to the team that trounced the Mantle club the week before. Oak Grove also blew up but Hillsboro held higher and committed nine costly errors. Hillsboro tied the score in the sixth but Oak Grove put over four runs in the eighth

## Admiral Byrd's Historic Airplane Exhibited Airport Here Next Week

The Stars and Stripes, world-famous airplane used by Admiral Richard E. Byrd on both of his expeditions to the south polar regions will be on exhibition and carry passengers from the local municipal airport northeast of Hillsboro, Wednesday and Thursday, July 22 and 23. From 2 p. m. to 10 o'clock in the evening. Passengers will get a new thrill in the night flights above the valley.

Accompanying the plane is Alton H. Walker, president of Western Airplane Distributors, Kansas City, Mo. His company is sponsoring the two-year world tour. At the controls will be Bob Myrick, middle western test pilot, who has 3000 hours of flying time to his credit. The plane is a seven passenger Fairchild, and explored more than a half million square miles of the Antarctic wilderness at the rate of 4000 square miles an hour, being flown 14 hours on the first expedition and 41 hours on the second.

The plane was unloaded at the Bay of Whales, January 13, 1929, and two days later made the first exploration flight with Admiral E. Byrd as navigator and Lead Kirby in the pilot's seat. January 16 the plane was flown to Little America. January 27 the "Stars and Stripes" was flown eastward from Little America, carrying Admiral Byrd to survey the area east of the Bay of Whales. At this time the plane was carrying a gross load of 5700 pounds, including 790 pounds of emergency equipment. The first important discovery of the expedition was made when the party sighted and named the Rockefeller mountains.

On March 29 of this same year this ship was flown to the rescue of the party headed by Charles Gould, which had been marooned in a blizzard at the base of Rockefeller mountains when the gold overturned and wrecked their Fokker monoplane which had been anchored to the ice.

The big plane then was placed in a hangar of snow and ice for the winter to where it remained until four years later when Admiral Byrd sent word that the "Stars and Stripes" had been removed from its tomb of snow and ice and been put into flight.
