

M. Dean in Farewell Concert Wednesday

As a farewell gesture to his friends of Hillsboro, Maurice Dean, baritone, will present a short concert Wednesday evening, July 29, at the Methodist church.

After graduating from the local high school, Mr. Dean, of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Dean, attended the Willamette university at Salem, graduating this past June. It was at Willamette that he had the privilege of living as well as studying, with Cameron Marshall, head of the music school of that institution.

Mr. Dean has appeared in several musical and dramatic productions at both the local high school and the university, besides being one of the soloists with the First Methodist church choir at Salem. During the past winter, he was also a member of the faculty at the state school for the blind, located in the same city. He leaves August 1, for Chicago to continue his vocal study at the MacLure school.

Assisting Mr. Dean as accompanist and piano soloist, will be Frank E. Sanders, music instructor at the state school for the blind. After completing the course at the aforementioned school, Mr. Sanders studied with Francis Richter, virtuoso pianist, formerly resident in Portland, and prior to that a pupil of the renowned Leschetzky in Vienna. Mr. Sanders is recognized as one of the leading musicians of the state and has gained an enviable reputation as a concert pianist throughout the entire west.

The program will begin at 8:15 o'clock, and the public is cordially invited, there being no charge of admission and no offering.
