# Nursery School Needs Increase and Equipment

Additional equipment is needed by the David Hill Nursery school, in order to care for more children. An increase from 16 to 20 is desired in order to meet state requirements so as to maintain the school in Hillsboro.

The nursery, which is made up of children two to five years old, is held week days from 9 a. m. to 3 p. m. Good habits are taught, proper food is provided at a noon meal and regular play and rest are part of the program. Parents work with the teachers in studying individual problems. The public is invited to visit the school.

Miss Mary L. Enslin of Oregon State normal and Miss Mary Westall of Linfield college have charge of the nursery, which is a Federal works project. It is sponsored in Hillsboro by the Parent-Teacher association, the Service club and the Coffee club.

Beds or cots, bedding (old blankets can be cut down for the small beds) and rubberized sheets are needed, cooking utensils such as large spoons, a small dish-pan, sauce-pan and a large double-boiler would be appreciated. There is also a shortage of play things, especially wheel toys, wagons, tricycles, large blocks, and dishes.
