

# Miss Harrington Has 25 Years Postal Work

Miss Angie Harrington this month completes her twenty-fifth year as clerk in the Hillsboro post office. She took her oath of office at the court house in July, 1911, when the late B. P. Cornelius was postmaster. At that time, she said, there were only two postal clerks, Edwin Cornelius and herself. The late Susan Morgan (later Cornelius) was assistant postmaster at the time. Art Miltenberger, carrier on route one, and John Ryan, carrier on route three, were other employees at that time who are still with the post office, Ryan now being a city carrier.

The post office 25 years ago was located on Second street, about where the Smith Grocery now stands. About two months later, when remodeling was started and a new building was constructed, the post office was moved across the street, just back of where the Commercial National bank is located, until a story was completed in the Old Fellows' building. After ten years in that building, the office was moved to the Woods building on Main street, where it remained until moving to the new twelve building last September.

Miss Harrington has served under five postmasters, the late B. P. Cornelius, the late J. C. Lamkin, H. A. Hall, Fred Holzner and L. T. McPherson. She is now in charge of the money order department, postal savings and registry. Miss Harrington has also held the office of local secretary of the civil service commission for 17 years, conducts examinations for postmasters, clerks and carriers, and other duties required by the district manager of Seattle. She is also local secretary of the National Federation of Post Office Clerks.

An amusing story is told of her first day in the post office, after many girls had applied for the position and worked only a few days. One of the employees remarked when he saw her: "What a new girl! Wonder if she will stay a week?"

Miss Harrington is affiliated with the Rebekahs, Pythian Sisters, Business and Professional Women's club, and is active in community affairs.
