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Swindler Sentenced for Mail Fraud

The promoter of an advance fee racket who in the past several months has bilked a number of Oregon firms out of money was indicted recently at Cincinnati, Ohio, upon a charge of using the mails to defraud, according to a release of the Portland Better Business Bureau.

Reuter's scheme was to advertise, offering to finance or refinance businesses. He called upon those responding to his advertising, and on promise of early financial assistance, would collect an advance payment as "expense money." In several complaints made to the Better Business Bureau, he is reported to have secured money from Oregon firms over a period of months, but failed to furnish any of the promised financing.

Reuter was arrested on the federal indictment in Dayton, Ohio, and is reported to have made a full confession in which he assumed the entire responsibility for the scheme.

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
