H. E. Cosby, extension poultryman, gave a demonstration on culling laying hens at the R. H. Kincheloe farm at Hazeldale, reports L. E. Francis, assistant county agent. Sixty poultrymen were present at the demonstration. Cosby culled 200 year-old hens and 100 two-year old hens, discussing in detail the procedure for properly culling the birds and giving the poultrymen an opportunity for carefully examining birds which he considered outstanding producers and others which he classed as readily determined culls.

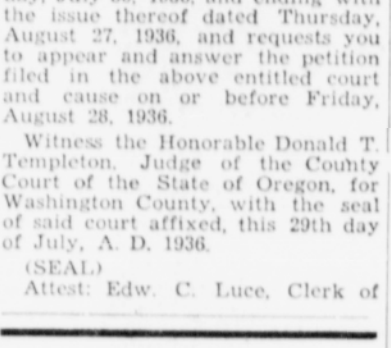

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Report Made on Sea Route Work

(Continued from page 1) have been built and a half mile of the temporary road graveled. Wolf Creek Sunset Camp sector, shows less progress, due to the fewer number of men employed and the lack of power machinery. The report shows 27 miles of clearing completed covering 41.8 acres of ground while 1.6 miles, or 34.8 acres, grubbed and made ready for grading. Excavation of dirt has made a total of 35,000 cubic yards. Temporary roads constructed total 2.4 miles and the completed portion half a mile. Three temporary bridges have been completed and 500 lineal feet of culvert installed. On the Sylvan end of the Wolf Creek road, 2.59 miles of roadway has been cleared, making 10 acres, and the same amount has been made ready for grading. Excavation of dirt includes 20,522 cubic yards. Completed road ready for surfacing includes 78 feet, with 562 lineal feet of culverts in place.
