

# First Play-Off Game Next Sunday

## Lose Game by Forfeit Again

### Only Five Players Show Up; to Willamette Sunday

Hillsboro "Smoke-eaters" were forced to forfeit another game Sunday to Tualatin when only five players appeared at game time. Tualatin loaned Hillsboro four of its men to round out a team so a game could be played and Hillsboro pounded out an easy 12 to 4 victory in the contest which, of course, did not count against Tualatin.

Had the "Smoke-eaters" won this game, a win over Willamette next Sunday would have thrown them two teams in a tie for the second half and by beating them once more Hillsboro would have undoubted title to the Eastern division. It won't be so easy now as Hillsboro must play Willamette Sunday and Willamette must play Newberg the following week as a five-way tie between Sherwood, Tualatin, Willamette, Newberg and Hillsboro is possible if Willamette loses to both Hillsboro and Newberg, which could easily happen. By winning one of its two remaining games Willamette would have undoubted title to the second half.

In the practice game with Tualatin Sunday Pitches Hoeky, the league's leading hurler, allowed but five scattered hits, three of which were very doubtful ones. The Hillsboro five, Roaky, Shattuck, Houck, Baker and Joos played errorless ball all day.

Houck led the hitting parade with three hits out of three times up, also drawing two walks. Catcher Hammerle had the satisfaction of throwing out two of his teammates stealing and also connected for two homers.

A double-header will be played at Willamette Sunday, the first game starting at 1:30 o'clock. One of the games will be the second half regular scheduled game and one will be a play-off game for the season championship of the league in case Willamette wins the second half. A three-game series will be played to decide the title and one of these games will be played at Willamette Sunday and the other two will probably be played at Hillsboro the week following in another double-header in order to shorten up the schedule and be finished in time to enter the fall tournament, starting August 30.

Willamette has a fine park and picnic grounds adjacent to the ball grounds, where any of the fans may have a picnic lunch if so desired. A fine swimming pool in the Willamette river is also close by and anyone that likes to swim is advised to take along a swimming suit. Orengo defaulted to Sherwood. Grinding Noise. When a constant grinding noise is heard in the rear axle housing while the car is running in high gear it is a sign that the gears or bearings are worn. It is pointed out by the Oregon State Motor association. An overhauling of those parts is usually necessary in such cases.

Speedometer Cable. At intervals of not more than five or six thousand miles the speedometer cable should be removed, cleaned thoroughly and treated with fresh lubricant, according to the emergency road service of the Oregon State Motor association.
