

Locals Score Win Over Willamette Week of Rest Drawn by Nine

Second Game Called Off Due Lack Pitchers

Hillsboro's fighting "Smoke-Eaters" went to Willamette Sunday to engage in a previous agreed doubleheader, but only one of the two games was played, when Willamette refused to play the second game when they found that their pitchers were being given a severe working over.

In the only game played, Willamette started Kollermeier on the mound, saving Leveen for the second tilt. Bill Joss sprang a surprise on them when he countered by starting Mickey Davis, Hillsboro's diminutive 15-year-old star second baseman on the mound, with his 16-year-old pal, Al Sorenson, behind the plate.

This unexpected move completely surprised both Willamette and the Hillsboro boys as no one knew that Davis is a pretty good chuckler, having pitched a no-hit, no-run game this year for El Rey Roofers, state Legion champions. Davis showed good stuff and only in an inning or two was he in danger. This left Rosky and Leverett for catching duty. Kollermeier lasted seven innings and was touched for seven runs. Herndon relieved him and was knocked off the mound in the tenth with the score tied and the bases full. Leveen, who had been called for the second game, was rushed in to stop the Hillsboro slugger and walked. Hahn forcing in the winning run. Shattock and Batchelor then singled to put Hillsboro ahead 3 to 9. Willamette could put over only two more in their half of the tenth as a nice throw to the plate by Don Batchelor cut off a man trying to score. Batchelor possesses a fine arm and has thrown out three men at home this year.

When Willamette saw how Leveen was being met with base hits they were skeptical of starting him the next game so "mugged" and refused to start the second tilt. A forfeit should have been in order, but for the fact that all concerned a forfeit was not demanded by the Hillsboro team.

This defeat put the second half title squarely up to Newberg now as Willamette must play Newberg a postponed game and a victory for Newberg would put Willamette, Hillsboro, Sherwood and Tualatin in a four-way tie for the second half title. If Willamette defeats Newberg, Hillsboro and Willamette will play off for the championship starting August 23, the place as yet undecided.

Batchelor, Joss, Davis, Baker and Shattock each got two hits while Shattock, Sorenson, Rosky and Oakes each got one.

111,762 of owned non-farm homes in Oregon. The HOLC refinanced mortgages on 84 percent of this number.

The total number of loans made in all states, Puerto Rico, Hawaii and Alaska was 1,025,817, involving the sum of \$3,692,900,324, making the average loan \$3,627.

More than 98 per cent of all money involved went for the refinancing of distressed homes by means of long-term replacement mortgages which are to be amortized fully over the term of the loan in small monthly payments.

The balance of the money advanced went for the restoration and conditioning of properties.

It is estimated that \$228,453,000 of the HOLC advances went to the tax offices of the nation, with the national average tax payment per loan being \$224.
