Mrs. Rosa Feuerstein had often looked for it on the place where it was found. The ring belonged to her oldest sister, Susie, who gave it to her for a keepsake when she knew that she was dying. The ring is not tarnished and the inscription "W. to S. '86" is still quite plain. It was the wedding ring of William Usher and Susie Zuercher, who were married in 1886.
