

Historical Pageant Presented at Fair

Federated Women's clubs of the county will be in charge of the Historical Pageant to be presented Thursday night at the county fair, with Mrs. H. H. Stannard directing. The pageant will be presented at 8:30 in the auditorium.

The prologue scene of the Washington County Pioneer dramatized pageant will represent Paris, in which Mrs. Thomas Jefferson was prime minister to France and became interested in the Fur company expedition to the Oregon country which Francis Ledyard was trying to organize. Scene two will present a scene in the United States when Mr. Jefferson was approached on the question of his candidacy for president. This prologue will be given by the Coffee club, and the local club will also be responsible for the characters, "Doubt" and "Understanding," who carry on the continuity of the entire pageant.

Episode I is presented in three scenes, and dramatizes the coming of Joseph Meek, Caleb Williams, Robert Newell and party to Washington county, the meeting at Joe Meek's home, and the meeting at Champoug. The Sunshine club of North Tualatin Plains will present this episode with Mrs. S. A. D. Meek as chairman.

Mrs. J. E. Sutherland and Miss Hesse will be joint chairmen for Episode II, which will be presented by the Scholla club, "The Star of Oregon," presented in two scenes, first depicting the cooperation between Pleasant Armstrong and Joseph Gale concerning the installation of the building of this ship to sail to San Francisco, and the second showing the "Star of Oregon" sailing to the Pacific.

Episode III, "Emanuel," is being presented by the Letyville club with Mrs. Frank A. Pranger as chairman. The first scene is in East Haven, Ill., and represents a conversation between Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Gregory in regard to farming in Washington county and its advantages, both spiritual and material, and the second scene depicts the wedding of David Hill and Mrs. Lucinda Wilson, with Rev. John Griffin performing the ceremony.

Episode IV will be presented by the Forest Grove club, with Mrs. Rex Wilson and Mrs. Otto Osborne as chairmen. The first scene will be a dramatization of the first school, with Mrs. Tabitha Brown and Rev. Harvey Clark as characters. The second will be the Pacific university graduating class, Jacob Hoover, Raleigh Scott, and Harry Hoover Killin, with President Marsh giving the address.

Episode V will be sponsored by the Cornelia club with Mrs. Earl Hobbs as chairman, the first scene being the meeting of the first "Fair Board." Scene two presents a few highlights of the Fair, the first band, a drill by the Grange team of Aloha, presentation of premiums by Thomas J. Dyer (first editor of the Oregonian) and several other features. The episode will be given in the first act as a parade pageant, and the "Golden Age" tableau presentation by the Hillsboro Grange.

Mrs. Fred Sewell has charge of the musical background and themes used throughout the pageant. Finis Brown will present the Laurel and Yucca quartet, Mrs. Veezy Gardner will be the soloist, the Bethany band will play an important part, and Mrs. Edith Tozier Weathered, aside from furnishing all historical facts in preparing the pageant will play a part in the presentation. Miss Rose Cave of the Business and Professional Women's club will be stage manager.
