MICKIE SAYS—



Fruit Products Go to All Parts

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis—Where do all the thousands of carlots of fruit and vegetables which are shipped from Oregon producing points go to anyway? This question is partly answered in extension circular No. 301 just issued through the O. S. C. agricultural extension economist's office which shows the carlot unloads of Oregon fruits and vegetables in 66 markets for the 10-year period 1925-1935.

Oregon apples during the period, for example, were shipped to 63 points all the way from San Antonio, Texas, to St. Paul, Minn., and from Portland, Ore., to Portland, Maine. New York was by far the largest average user of Oregon apples while next in line were Portland, Ore., San Francisco, Los Angeles, Chicago, and Kansas City, Mo.

The unloads of Oregon pears show a market difference from apples. New York is far in the lead again, but in second place is Chicago, followed by Philadelphia, Portland, Ore., Boston and Detroit. Last year, however, San Francisco ranked close to Boston. A total of 3411 cars were shipped in 1935 and of these 1742 were unloaded in 45 of the 66 domestic markets from which such unload reports are available.

Oregon fresh prunes are shipped to nearly as many markets as Oregon apples, going mostly to eastern, middle-western and southern states. Oregon celery is a product consistently shipped to many markets with Omaha, Minneapolis, Houston, Oklahoma City, Sioux City and San Francisco among the heavy purchasers. Onions went to 54 of the 66 points during the period.

As the report covers only 66 markets, it does not show the destination of all the carlots loaded
