

Cherry Grove Logger Killed

Aloha Boy on Bicycle Struck by Automobile

Dan W. Wikander, 47, Cherry Grove logger, was fatally injured near Patton valley highway junction about 8:45 o'clock Thursday night when he staggered in front of an automobile driven by C. L. Shearer of Corvallis. He was taken to the hospital in Forest Grove last night with a fractured skull and lacerations and then to the county hospital here, where he died the next morning.

Sheriff J. W. Connell and Deputy Sheriff Harry Johnson, who investigated, found that Wikander had been walking on the highway near the Patton valley junction. Shearer stated that the man staggered out from the side of the road directly in front of his car.

William Seely, 15, was taken into the St. Vincent's hospital in Portland Saturday afternoon in an unconscious condition as the result of being struck by a truck driven by Wesley Platt of Portland route 8. Investigation conducted by Deputy Sheriffs Johnson and Richard Busch revealed that the boy had rode his bicycle out on to the highway in front of the truck at Aloha.

Funeral services for Mr. Wikander were held at the Cherry Grove Baptist church Sunday and interment was in the Cherry Grove cemetery under the direction of the Forest Grove Undertaking company.

Deceased was born in Sweden February 11, 1889, and came to the U. S. 23 years ago. He is survived by the widow and two children, Eolof and Viola, and three step-children, John, Lillian and Dillard Pearson, all at home. His mother, one sister and seven brothers, all of Sweden, and two brothers, Harry and Runo Wikander of Cherry Grove, also survive.
