dition of some form of organic matter which may be cover crops, straw or manure will do more to improve it than applications of estone. Limestone is a corrective of the acid condition in the soil.
On land that is in a comparatively high state of fertility a somewhat acid reaction is not going to be the limiting factor in profitable yields of non-legume crops.

Where limestone is to be used the rate of application should depend upon the degree of acidity, but profitable increases in crops on poorly-drained, and land that is low in fertility, can not be ex-pected from its application without a general program of soil improvement.


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
