Celebrate Anniversary with Sale Friday

Beginning Friday, in conjunction with the annual Washington county fair, Weil's Department store will celebrate its 23rd anniversary in Hillsboro. The event will be marked by a sale advertised in this issue of The Argus.

Weil's was located first in Hillsboro in 1913 when the store was operated in the building now occupied by Ireland's hardware. In 1919 the property on which the present store is located was purchased.

This property was occupied by the old Tualatin hotel, which was wrecked except for the newer portion which was purchased by J. H. Garrett and moved to Fourth avenue between Lincoln and Jackson streets. This building burned Sunday afternoon.

The present building, occupied by Weil's, houses one of the most modern and complete department stores in suburban Oregon.

At present 20 salespeople are employed in addition to the regular office force. The business has been continuously carried on by Nathan Weil and sons Reuben, Morris and Jake.
