

County P.-T.A. Met M.E. Church Saturday

Representatives from Parent-Teacher associations in all parts of Washington county met with state officers at the Hillsboro Methodist church Saturday to consider new plans and enlarged ideals for P.-T. A. work.

Mrs. William Kletzer of Portland, state president, in greeting the delegates at the morning session said she felt all were present because they were so urged by belief in the work that they could not stay away, and that the plans of the meeting were to outline the easiest and best methods of accomplishing the ideals of P.-T. A.

These ideals Mrs. Kletzer stated as four-fold: The conservation of childhood and youth, the enrichment of home and family life, enhancing community life, and furthering co-operative relationships between home and school.

Mrs. Kletzer said the P.-T. A. is against legislative measures which curtail revenues of schools, counties, and cities, which are needed for health and education without at the same time providing other means for raising these revenues. Mrs. Kletzer also said the bill for so-called truthful advertising does not provide for telling all the truth, or who shall decide what the truth is. If passed it would repeal all the measures we have worked for for the protection of health and public welfare in advertising.

Mrs. Wall, state vice-president, and Mrs. Kletzer, with members drawn from the audience, demonstrated the forum method of discussion to be used this year with the character education subjects outlined in the Parent-Teacher magazine.

Mrs. Sam Bellah, magazine chairman, announced a 75 per cent increase in the use of the magazine, the official organ of the association.

Mrs. James B. Ward, formerly of Washington county, now state membership chairman, gave new plans for arousing membership interest. Mrs. Chappel, publications chairman, brought a wealth of material and new methods.

The Hillsboro American Legion sextet, who won honors at the Roseburg convention under the direction of Mrs. L. C. Kramien, sang two numbers. Miss Martha James read "Women Who Live in Lonely Places," by Grace Hall.

Delegates were registered from Sherwood, Durham, Tigard, Garden Home, Beaverton, Cedar Mill, Reedville, Hillsboro, Shute, North Plains Westimber and two associations at Forest Grove.
