Events in connection with the 4-H show will continue all day Friday, which is Grange and Farmers' Union day. Picnic dinners will be the features of the two organizations at noon.

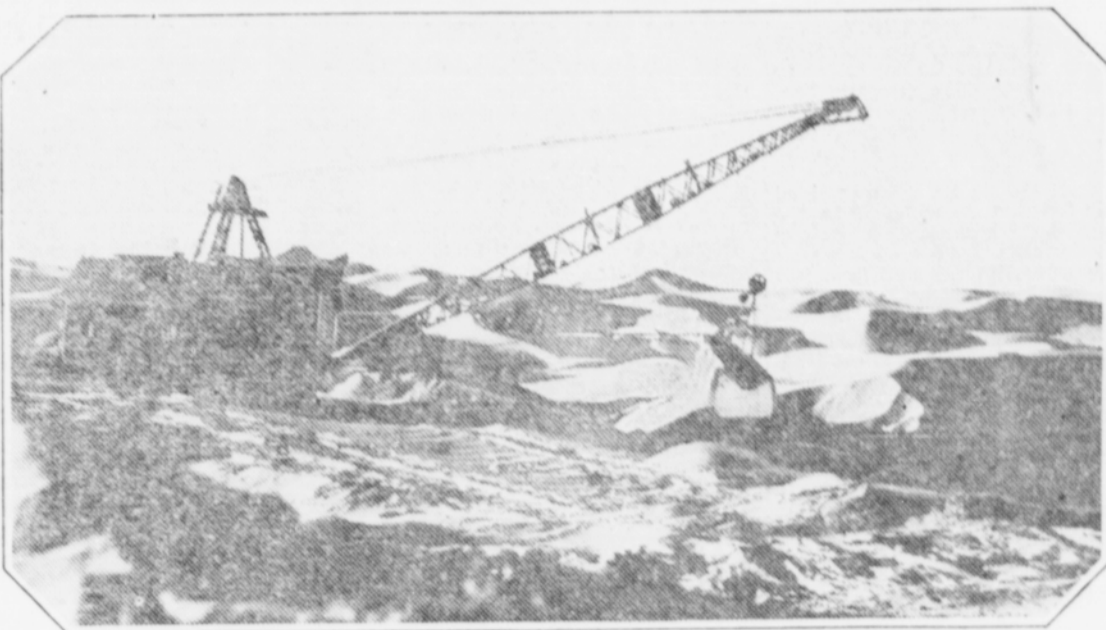

Take Cash from Busch and Bailey Offices

Gaining entrance through windows which they broke, thieves Sunday night burglarized the A. H. Busch service station and the Bailey service station, both on Baseline street. The thieves took \$53 in change from the Busch station and \$15 from Bailey's, according to a report. Part of the money was in the tills and the remainder hidden in the rooms.

In addition to the robbery, an automobile owned by Wilbur Mallory of Yamhill was stolen about 1 o'clock Monday morning from its parking place at the Coslett service station and barbecue, where Mr. and Mrs. Mallory had stopped for lunch on their way home from Portland.

It is believed that the burglars may have stolen the Mallory machine, a Chevrolet coupe, to make their escape after the robbery. Portland detectives investigated the robbery Monday as a possible clew to several holdups staged recently in Portland.

Lone Oak service station near Tigard was held up early Thursday morning by two youths, who obtained \$49.50 and fled toward Portland, according to Sheriff J. W. Connell and deputies, who investigated.

Halting their car in front of the service station at 3:35 a. m., the young men forced Wallace Stenlake of Portland, who was conducting a traffic count on the Pacific highway, into the building and also held up the attendant, Kenneth Johnston of Tigard. They took \$48.58 from the cash register. Before departing they tore the telephone wires loose.
