

### Annual Meeting Held Sunday at Pioneer Church

Last Sunday's annual pioneer gathering at the old West Union Baptist church was considered the most interesting one in all the years Captain Hall of McMinnville has been presenting a program there the last Sunday in August. There was a picnic dinner at noon, and a program in the afternoon, with Captain Hall presiding.

The principal address was given by one of his old college classmates, Rev. Llider, now pastor of a church at Tulare, Cal. Having never visited Oregon before his tribute to the pioneers was greatly appreciated. D. C. Latourette of Oregon City gave interesting and amusing experiences of his grandfather, the Rev. Ezra Fisher, who was one of the first Baptist ministers in charge at the West Union church. Those making brief talks were Mrs. Harriett Hoover Killin of Portland, who was born on a farm in this vicinity, and who attended church and Sunday school there over 70 years ago; and Frank Moore, who lived near there 57 years ago, and had not been here for 50 years.

A very interesting paper was read by Mrs. Finley, daughter of the late Rev. C. A. Woody, a pioneer Baptist minister of Oregon. Others who spoke were Verne Bright of Aloha, Dr. Kenneth Latourette of Yale university, and Edith Tozier Weathered of Hillsboro. A male quartet furnished the music.

West Union was the first Baptist church organized in the whole Oregon country, in 1844. David Lenox was the first to start the organization. The present building was erected in 1853, and the hand-made lumber and nails are now a curiosity.
