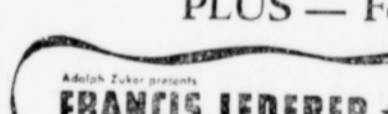

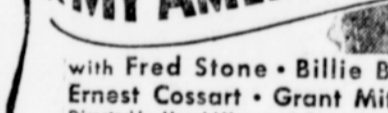
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Miss Bierly Weds Herman Gamroth

After a short wedding trip the couple will make their home near Forest Grove.

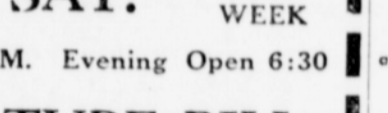
Ex-Governor Visits—
