September 3

Drought problem discussed at Des Moines, Iowa, by Roosevelt and Landon other drought state governors. Landon tells newsmen: "President Roosevelt is a very fine, charming gentleman."

Drunkard couple in Portland bribe baby son. Get jail sentences and \$500 fine.

New Jersey state troopers foil plot of alien radical to assassinate Roosevelt.

Supreme attack staged by rebels and allies to capture Iran.

September 4

Bendix air speed race plane explodes in mid-air over Kansas and Pilot Joe Jacobson uses parachute.

Roosevelt returns east with drought parley data. F. R. and Landon say Des Moines conference to be productive of drought aid action.

Mrs. Beryl Barkham, English society woman, starts solo flight to New York.

New left wing government goes into power in Madrid, Spain. Francisco Caballeor, socialist, new premier. Rebel capture Iran, battle continues.

Roosevelt lauds Mark Twain at Hannibal, Mo., in dedicating Mark Twain Memorial bridge.

Cheering Springfield, Ill., crowd hears President Roosevelt say that federal credit is on a "sounder basis" than at any other time in the nation's history.

September 5

Mrs. Beryl Barkham, British aviatrix, flies Atlantic. Crackup in Nova Scotia ends daring flight.

Ten killed when tri-motor sightseeing plane crashes in Pennsylvania.

Governor Landon proclaims a labor holiday with "no room in it for class divisions and prejudices."

Arthur Brugger of Portland takes Astoria regatta swimming honors in swim across Columbia river.

Spanish ambassador to U. S. resigns post because beliefs incompatible with new Spanish government.

Spanish rebels take Fort Guadalupe and march on San Sebastian. Oregon State college adds to teaching staff, prepare for student body of 3500.

September 6

Mrs. B. E. Weaverston, 25, Portland, killed in auto crash near McMinnville. Claude Eugene McCutcheon, 23, Portland, fatally injured in auto accident at Tillamook. Billy Fuller, 9, Rickreall, fatally hurt when struck by car at Rockaway.

Business index shows big business spurt on Pacific coast. Lumber and oil production gain.

President Roosevelt sets aside \$2,500,000 more to aid in finding jobs. Long-range program for aiding drought-stricken farmers planned. In fireside chat appeals to employers, large and small, to use help of federa and state employment services. Re-employment in industry speeding rapidly, he says.

Spanish loyalists recapture key position to southern door to Madrid. Boy, 19, blows up bridge laden with rebels.

September 7

Landon speaking before American Legion in Kansas City says America must combine "intelligent legislation" with "the strong will for peace" to keep this nation out of war. "We must be ready to sacrifice short-run profits," he said.

Holiday finds labor facing tremendous internal war. Landon calls for a "united" organized labor "struggle for higher living standards." President Green of A. F. of L. says there has been "considerable improvement" in employment since last Labor day and offers labor's proposal of a 6-hour day and the 5-day week as solution. Miss Perkins, secretary of labor, says private industry has absorbed 1,000,000 unemployed in last year.

Salt Lake paper poll shows Utah 2 to 1 for Roosevelt.

Spanish loyalists report rebels checked in determined effort to capture Madrid.

French communists call strike to force French government to aid Spanish government in civil war.

Secretary of Treasury Morgenthau announces treasury's \$914,000,000 September borrowing would be on 20 to 23-year basis and says this is evidence of "a constantly growing confidence in the government's credit."

Colonel Knox declares present administration had "fomented labor strife" and had passed laws raising "the iron hand of government" over labor.

NUTRITION AND THE EYES
By Oregon State Board of Health

Physicians have long noted a close relationship among the different parts of the human body. Apparently our organs do not function separately; they are more or less dependent on each other for normal stimulation activity. This seems to indicate that the functions of the special parts of the body are vitally dependent upon general welfare. We must, therefore, keep our bodies in a healthy condition if we expect the different organs to operate smoothly.

One of the main factors in keeping a body healthy is nutrition, and a good way of regulating nutrition is by the exercise of intelligent control of the diet. Essential to adequate nutrition is the above foods.

Animals, (including man) store Vitamin A principally in the liver. Lesser quantities are found in the blood, kidneys and lungs. More recently it has been found in the retina of the human eye. An interesting example of the results of malnutrition on a specific organ is the effect of the lack of vitamin A on the eyes. When general bodily health is impaired by a lack of the yellow coloring matter of the above foods.

This vitamin is found principally in green and yellow vegetables, in fresh eggs and cream, and in various animal fats. It may be manufactured from carotene, the yellow coloring matter of the above foods.
