street, making more capacity and saving costly long connections under the street, or the tearing up of paving through the center.

The two lines, the engineers claim, serve to keep a safe, open traffic lane on the highway. So far the only traffic accidents caused by the digging was when two cars piled up on dirt near the northeast corner of Shute park two weeks ago.

This week crews are working in the west and northwest parts of Hillsboro, water packing the backfill of the street after this operation is completed. Where a surplus remains it is planned to haul it away.

Next week it is expected that both digging machines will be working in the northeast and final section of the new sewer district.

Present payrolls cover 85 men working in two shifts. The crews contain both skilled and unskilled men and a high percentage of men certified through the national agencies as taken from the relief rolls according to company representatives.

This week all of the various tanks in the disposal plant were filled with water for test purposes and the machinery placed in operation including the huge battery of air compressors which throw streams of air into the sewage to hasten the purification process.

Flower boxes filled with green and blooming plants have also been added to the windows of the two white painted buildings, one of which houses the compressor machinery and the other the laboratory and office building.
