Timber in Big Burn Makes Good Lumber
Washington county lumber industry benefits by a recent announcement made by the government relative to lumber from dead forest trees, tests disclosing that such lumber is as good as that taken from live trees.

Prejudices against lumber from sound dead trees have been disproved by the Forest Products Laboratory of the United States Forest Service. Experts in the laboratory have not been able to see any difference between seasoned lumber from live trees and seasoned lumber from sound dead trees, if the weathered or charred outside of the dead trees has been cut away. Timber cut from insect or fire-killed trees is just as good as the timber cut from live trees of similar quality. This assumes, of course, that neither wood has been injured more than the other by decay or insects. The only difference is that lumber from dead trees may be partly seasoned when sawed.

after it is killed, the sapwood is likely to become decayed or badly infested by wood-boring insects, and in time the heartwood also will be similarly damaged. But the same thing may happen to logs cut from live trees and not properly cared for.

The forest service findings emphasize the logic of specifying that a lumber order must be filled from the live trees but rather of insisting that the order must meet a certain standard as to freedom from insect and decay damage.

531 Loans Closed on County Farms

In Washington county 531 loans were closed in the amount of \$1,139,000 by the Federal Land bank and the Land Bank commissioner, from May 1, 1933, through June 30, 1936, according to information received by Edgar Freed, state director for the National Emergency council.

Of the loans in Washington county, 223 for \$626,300 were made by the Federal Land bank and 308 totaling \$512,700 by the Land Bank commissioner.

Through the agency of the FCA in Oregon \$23,638,400 have been loaned during the same period. These loans included 3,268 of Federal Land bank loans for \$13,001,600, and 5,053 Land Bank commissioner loans in the amount of \$10,636,800.

In addition to refinancing loans through the Farm Credit Administration, the farmers in Oregon were benefited also by a reduction in mortgage principal which amounted to \$2,212,200. Further savings resulting from lowered interest rates are estimated at \$618,000 annually.

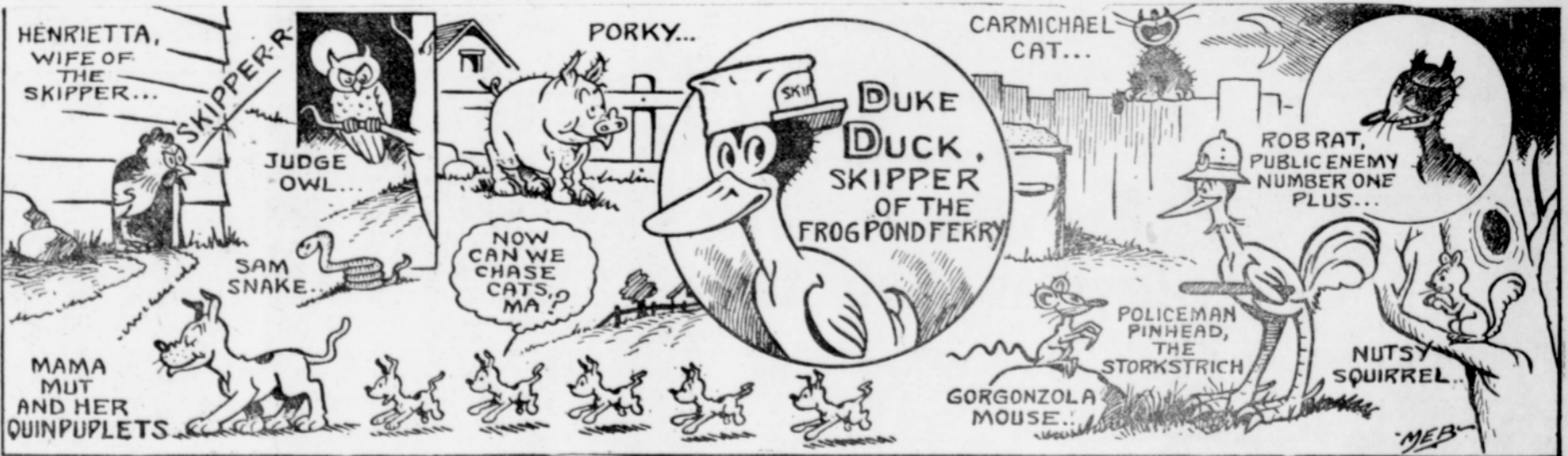

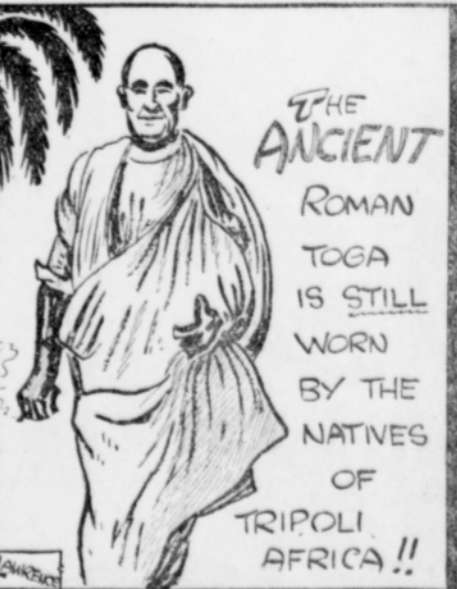

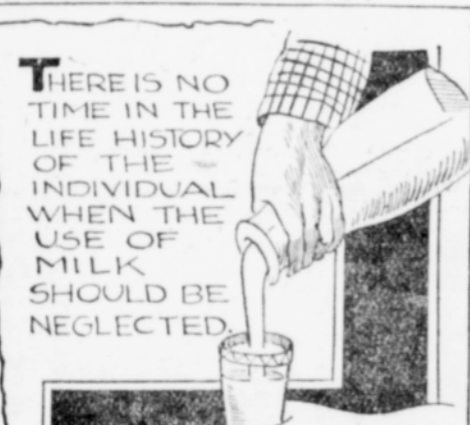
