Delphian Society Opens 10th Year

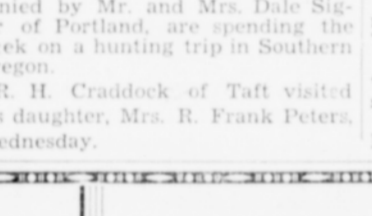

One thing she deplored was that people employing those on relief expected to pay much less for labor, skilled or unskilled, than to others for the same work.
