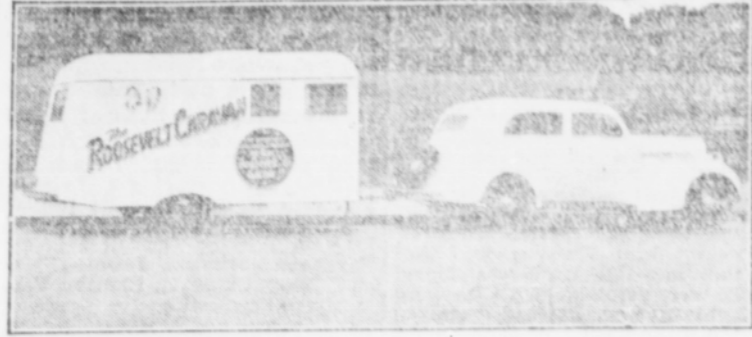

C. B. Taylor Laid to Rest

Resident of County for 60 Years Dies Friday

Charles B. Taylor, 86, long time county resident, died at the family home near Banks September 17 and funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the Forest Grove Undertaking company chapel.

Mr. Taylor, son of Charles M. and Elizabeth Taylor, was born September 14, 1850, at Rockport, Missouri, and during his early life was affiliated with the Methodist church. When 26 years of age he came to Oregon by way of an emigrant train to San Francisco, then to Portland by boat, and out to Forest Grove, stopping at the Sloan hotel, present site of Forest Grove funeral chapel. He then attended to the home of Ira Purdin Sr., pioneer farmer of near Forest Grove. Part of this farm is still owned by descendants of Mr. Purdin.

He was married March 11, 1889, to Mary Ann Purdin, daughter of Charles Wesley and Melissa Purdin of near the present site of Banks. For 42 years Mr. Taylor had lived on the home farm, where he passed away.

Deceased is survived by the widow, Mary Ann Taylor, and the following children: Miss Lena and Ellis Taylor, of Banks, route 1; Mrs. Melissa Dersham, of Cornelius, route 1; and Rhasee Taylor, Forest Grove, route 1. Four grandchildren, Melvin and Harold Dersham, Norma Jean Taylor and Charles Lewis Taylor; two half-sisters, Mrs. Rhoda Watson of Buxton, and Mrs. Martha Gentry of Rockport, Missouri, also survive.
