Move Made to Hold Back Wilson Route

heart and give Tillamook an opportunity to salvage a part of the great wealth which was destroyed in the fire of 1933, declare the sponsors.

Sponsors' funds for the Wilson river project are obtained through contributions by the two counties in which work is underway, and in addition, Portland and Multnomah county contribute as a means of furnishing employment for the army of unemployed who obtain subsistence through WPA work.

The main attack, as launched by the Portland newspaper, is directed at L. C. Apperson, city engineer of Portland, who carried on the main battle to get approval of the projects in Washington, D. C., and who assumed authority for general supervision at the request of those furnishing the funds for equipment.

At present there has been no shift in laborers from the Wilson to the Wolf creek and the machinery still is in operation, it is reported.

However, the crews on Wolf creek have been hampered because of lack of trucks to transport the men to and from the jobs. The men are picked up in Portland, taken to work and taken back at night, their working time on the project being governed by the length of time required to make the trip from Portland to the job and back again at night.

In other words, the time the men are taken from Portland until they arrive there on their return, all counts as working time. The average day is 7 1/2 hours. Until such time as more transportation is available to Wolf creek, more men cannot be added to the crew.

Meanwhile plans are underway to gravel the newly constructed road from Glenwood to the Washington county line on Wilson river, and to construct and gravel a detour road from Westlimer through the hills to the Lyons construction company sector of the Wolf creek road, making a connecting link between Timber and the completed sections of the highway on the west side of the mountains.

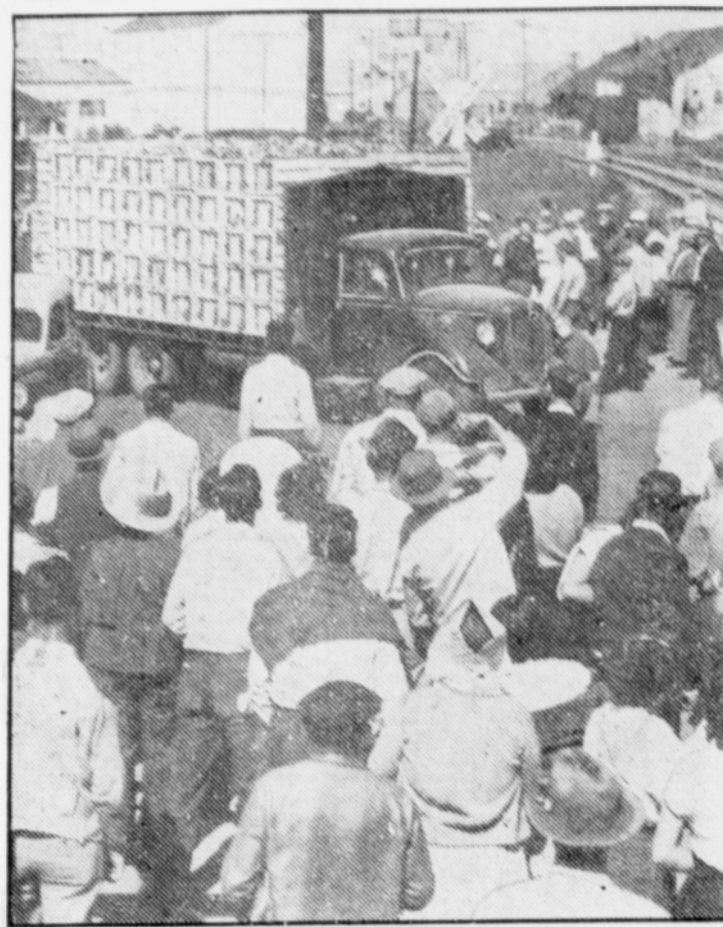

The above picture was typical of many scenes throughout the Salinas valley in California as 5000 striking lettuce workers sought to make their strike effective by tying up transportation of the perishable vegetable between fields and refrigerated storage houses. Stones were thrown through truck windshields and kerosene was poured on the lettuce. Striking employees said the million-dollar lettuce crop, which forms the basis of the nation's salads, would spoil unless moved to market soon.

William Moore says that he is all through picking hops. He only had one fourth of a crop this year.

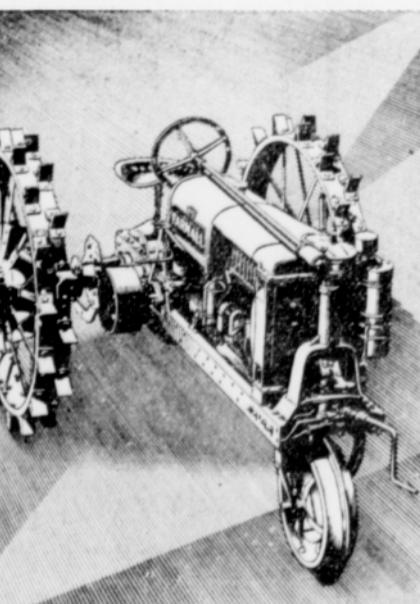
