Hawaiian Souvenirs; Local Fruits Shown

Souvenirs from the Hawaiian Islands are shown in the Argus window this week through the courtesy of Mrs. Verlin Cochran. The collection includes a fine piece of tapa cloth, the art of making which is almost extinct; table mats made from the leaves of the hala tree, the leaves of which are three or four feet in length; a bowl made from the wood of the koa tree, now becoming rare; two dishes made from coconut shells, one of which is used for putting Hawaiian staple dish; liquor bottle corks, all the rage at present; and souvenir toys from the islands.

In addition the window contains a display of fine Star King apples brought in by William Robb of north of Hillsboro. Japanese bulbs popcorn grown by S. W. Baughman of Orengo, Rhineland grapes brought in by Fred Bolling, a spring of Jerusalem artichokes with red and green fruit both on the same stem, brought in by Mrs. Ellen Lytle of east of Hillsboro, and a large cucumber grown by A. Santoro of near Beaverton.

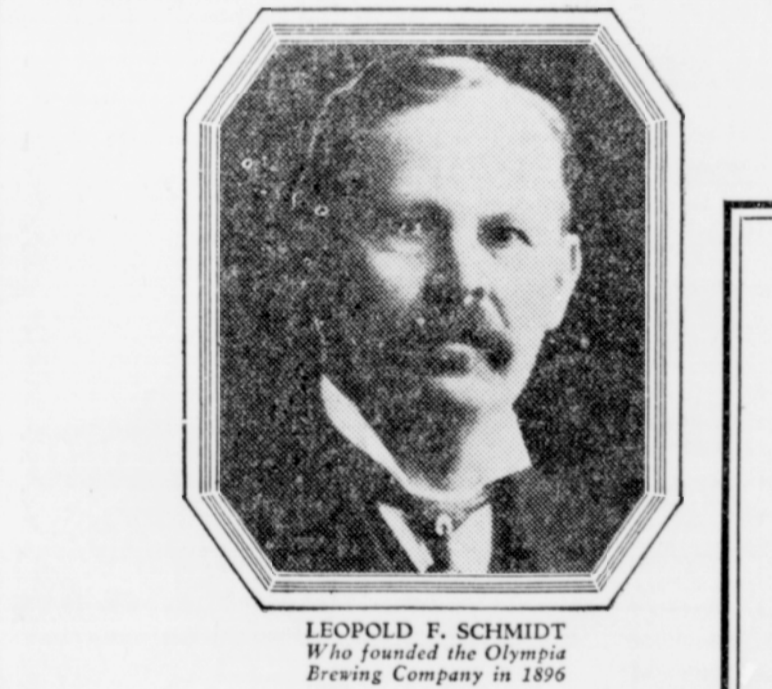
