Rabbi Sandrow Says Living for America a Duty

"Living in America is a precious privilege, but living for America is a solemn duty," declared Rabbi Edward T. Sandrow of Congregation Anavai Shalom, Portland, on Monday evening, delivering the address at the ceremonies by which Allan J. Sigler was inaugurated as the 12th president of the Christian clubs of Hillsboro, at Pillgrim House, 11

The inauguration was the quarterly joint meeting of representatives of the clubs and chapters affiliated with Hillsboro Christian Council. The new president, who succeeds Richard M. Abts in office, will head the central body with which nine chapters of high school and college age young people are united. He is a senior at the local high school.

Three things make up the true American spirit," said the Portland leader. "The first is liberty; liberty of religion, liberty of politics, and liberty of speech. Even though we do not agree with someone else, we must grant them the freedom to think and worship and speak without restraint. The second thing is unity; and unity does not mean uniformity in the Russian or German method. The third thing is the spirit of democracy, spelled with a small 'd.' Not only the foreign born need Americanization, the native-born are in just as great need for the cultivation of the true American spirit of the founders of the nation. We must not permit any tyranny to fasten its hold on American institutions."

Garrett, Commander Jake Weil of the American Legion, and President Elaine Caldwell of the Business and Professional Women's club. Pastor Henry S. 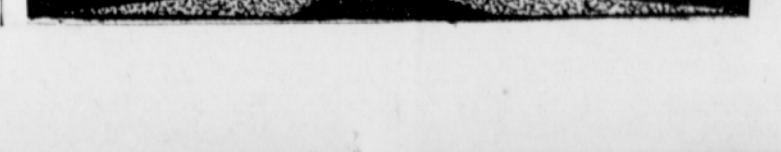
