

# Patterson Speaker; Committees Named

Vote "NO" on the bill to abolish compulsory military training at the state university and state college, admonished Paul L. Patterson, attorney in an address before members of the Legion Auxiliary at the meeting Tuesday evening at the Veterans' hall. He stressed the fact that without adequate training in military tactics the United States would be unprepared to withstand an attack from a military nation and cited convincing reasons why all patriotic organizations and others should work toward the defeat of this bill.

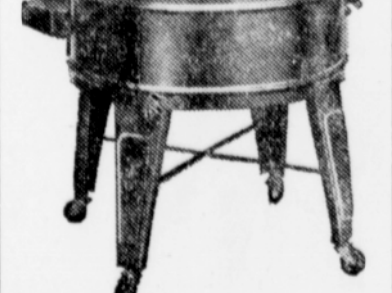
