Inspections of the business houses, downtown property and chimneys wherever called on.

All school children in Hillsboro have been given questionnaires which they have been requested to take home for the purpose of filling out the answers. All children returning the slips will be given an admission to a special fire prevention show at the Venetian theatre Friday afternoon, according to Dillon.

Questions asked relate to the conditions in the home as to fire hazards. When the questions have been properly answered, the blank will show the various steps in such home to keep it safe from fire.

Fire Prevention Week is observed nationally each year as a means of reminding the public of fire hazards and thus assisting in reducing the number of fires.

"Along with fire prevention week," S. W. McHugh, fire chief, said Wednesday, "let us think also of accident prevention in connection with fires. All citizens should remember that in the state traffic law, fire apparatus is given right-of-way while answering fire calls."

"There has been a great deal of trouble in the past, and very recently cars out in ahead of the trucks and also parked within a short distance of the fire. If a second car should be answered, the apparatus has considerable difficulty in getting clear, which means a loss of time and consequently a greater fire loss and a possible accident."

"Cars should not be parked within two blocks of the scene of the fire, and all cars should pull to the side of the street at the sound of the fire siren."

"The chief of police has been instructed to tag all cars violating these laws and all persons receiving a tag will be fined."

"So," McHugh concludes, "let us prevent fires and also prevent accidents when a fire call is being answered."
