

Grand Jurors Begin Session

Tigard Man Says Indictment for Assault Illegal

County grand jury will begin its session at 9 o'clock this morning (Thursday) with at least six cases to consider, none of great importance, according to G. Russell Morgan, district attorney.

P. R. Cook of Tigard, charged in circuit court with assault with a dangerous weapon in connection with an argument between the defendant and a gun club at Tigard, has entered a plea in bar in his case, alleging that he was caused to testify before the grand jury which indicted him for the alleged assault.

In his plea he sets forth that under the constitution he cannot be made a witness against himself and that he was summoned to appear before the grand jury and there subjected to questions by the district attorney. He alleges that this same grand jury returned an indictment against him on the testimony which he gave.

He declares that he supposed he was testifying in connection with a complaint which he was lodged against the shot and clay pigeons used by the gun club which fell on his property.

The plaintiff alleges injuries to right leg, back and nervous system and alleges that she has not been able to perform her duties as a housewife since nor will be able to in the future.

WILLIAM G. VICTOR

William G. Victor, 77, former Washington county resident, died September 29, at Mayview, Wash., and funeral services were held at the Mayview chapel last Thursday forenoon, with Rev. Marjorie McCusker officiating. Active pallbearers were all sons of pioneer Mayview settlers.

William Grant Victor was born in Jackson county, Oregon, September 23, 1859, and when a small child moved with his parents to Washington county, settling about six miles from Hillsboro, near West Union, where he was reared to manhood. His mother died when he was 13 years of age. The family moved to Garfield county, Wash., in 1877. He was married to Miss Amelia Hesse of near Hillsboro on May 13, 1891. He took an active interest in public affairs and was a delegate to the first state convention of the Republican party of Washington at Walla Walla.

He is survived by his widow; three sons, Chester H. and Oscar W. of Mayview, and Earl of Spokane; three sisters, Mrs. Helen Deichman of Hillsboro, and Misses Lena and Elvera Victor of Portland.

Agricultural Conservation Leaders Proposing Changes

With the series of 32 county AAA discussion meetings completed in this state, Oregon leaders of the agricultural conservation program are preparing to propose a greatly simplified method of computing possible benefits under the 1937 program, according to officials of the O. S. C. extension service who co-operated in holding the meetings.

County committeemen and other interested farmers took part in all of the meetings held and much information on the strong points and weaknesses of the 1936 program was obtained from the discussion, as requested by the national officials who are now working on details of the 1937 set-up.

A summary of Oregon recommendations made by producers in these meetings is now being prepared by the state committee and representatives of the extension service who will present it at the forthcoming district conference at Pocatello, Idaho, October 14. Representatives from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Utah will take part in that meeting.

The most significant change to be proposed by the Oregon delegation is one to simplify the method of figuring the total possible benefits which may be earned on any given farm by following approved soil conservation practices. Under the 1936 plan there were two or three ways of arriving at the total possible benefits conferred among growers not entirely familiar with the methods. At the same time the total amount of benefits available were approximately \$1 an acre for every acre in farms in the United States.
