#### Growers Hear Prune Plans

Normanden Named Member of Central Committee

Between 25 and 30 prune growers of Washington county assembled in the Forest Grove chamber of commerce rooms Friday night to discuss plans for advertising Oregon prunes in eastern markets as a competitive product for various fruit and vegetable juices and California dried prunes and citrus fruits.

Herb Normanden, Forest Grove prune grower, was selected to represent the district on the central committee, which is considering the advertising campaign.

This campaign is designed to stimulate the sale of dried prunes to the housewife as a breakfast

dish which is as healthful as the canned fruit juices, citrus fruits or tomato juice.

All of these other articles, it was pointed out to the growers, are highly advertised with the result that vast increases in sales and likewise in production, has resulted. Meanwhile the Oregon prune has been lagging far behind in popularity and consequently in value to the producer.

In comparison with other products, prune consumption during the depression fell far behind other products in the natural decline in consumer demand.
