guard as a citizens part of the national army, and the trained officers training corps. These last are produced through military education in the schools, and to be used only in case of national defense when they become the foundation on which the conscript army will be developed.

These officers are not for aggression but for defense, he declared.

**May Be Excused**

Patterson pointed out that in reality students are not under compulsion to take military training because if they are working their way through school and need the time for their work, they are excused; if the time is needed for other studies, they are excused, and if they are conscientious objectors, they are excused.

The proponents of the bill, Patterson told his audience, declare that because the training is compulsory it is un-American. "If this is true of military education," Patterson declared, "then it is true of all subjects which a student is compelled to take before he can graduate. It is also true of the laws which compel the sending of a child to school until he is a certain age, and it is true of every other law designed to regulate and promote peace and safety among the people of the commonwealth."

Recently, Patterson pointed out, 10,400 questionnaires were sent to that number of students who had taken military training, asking them if they opposed it. Of this number 98.5 per cent replied that they favored this course as a compulsory subject.

Patterson reasoned that as it cost \$900 each to educate a student for a year in a public college or university, it is only right that the student give something in return. As the student must spend 90 hours per year in the military course, he is paying back at the rate of \$10 per hour.

Another point brought out was a recent study of the military course at the University of Oregon where three members of the faculty, opposed to compulsory training, were assigned to make a thorough study of the course. They reported at the end of their study that they could find nothing of a militaristic nature in the course, Patterson said.

**Power Bill Opposed**

After declaring that he believed authors of the state power bill were honest and sincere, but seriously in error, Elbert Bede, former Cottage Grove editor, associated with Oregon Business & Investors Inc., in opposing the state power bill, explained what he believes to be the dangers of the bill and gave reasons why he believed it should not be enacted. He said, in part:

"We have the inconsistency of those who say we have too many commissions proposing that we have still another one; the state power commission, and give to this body powers never before suggested anywhere for a political commission. The three men of the commission who might be wholly inexperienced in any business, would have power to do anything and everything necessary or convenient to promote a state power system. Under such carte blanche they could enter upon almost any conceivable kind of public ownership, being restrained only by the constitution.

"Under the powers of eminent domain the commission would give only five days' notice before taking whatever property it might conceive to be convenient to the conduct of a power business.

"While there evidently was an attempt to protect municipalities, it seems quite certain that municipally-owned utilities might find their activities controlled by this state commission. At least it would take a supreme court opinion to decide otherwise.

"There is no need to fear that we need the state power bill in order to have money for Bonneville. There is little reason to believe 'Uncle Sam' is going to quit before he has finished that job. He would be a poor business man if he manufactured a lot of electric energy and left it idle at the dam. Elsewhere he has sent the power to those who wanted it. There is no reason to believe he will do otherwise here.

"To say that the state power bill doesn't actually vote bonds is literally true but is begging the issue. If we are not to have bonds, there is no need to enact the power bill, which would be useless without the annual 4-H club banquet where Clayton won sixth prize for swine showmanship and ninth prize for Duroc-Jersey swine exhibits.
