

Parent-Teacher Group Passes 3 Resolutions

Hillsboro Parent-Teacher association met Monday evening at the Union High school. After several songs led by Mrs. L. C. Kramien, a number of games were enjoyed, followed by the regular business meeting. Several resolutions were adopted by the association, namely, a resolution favoring the hiring of a full-time school nurse for the schools of Hillsboro; a resolution favoring the hiring of a Home Demonstration agent for the county; and a resolution favoring the establishment of a county health unit.

Mrs. J. C. May, who was in charge of the program, introduced Mayor J. H. Garrett, and read a proclamation on parent-teacher aims and ideals. Mrs. C. M. Krucheck reported briefly on 4-H club work and appealed to the association for leaders to volunteer for this splendid work, which is of great benefit to the school child.

Rev. Guy Duffield, speaking on the subject of "Honesty," said: "The home, the school and the church are the three most important influences in the life of a child, and of these three the home is the most important. There is no greater characteristic that we can seek to develop than the characteristic of honesty. The seeds of honesty must be implanted in the mind and heart of the child in its very earliest days. The first and foremost thing we must do is to be honest with ourselves. Honesty pays in every walk of life."
