Sheriff Charges Reckless Driving of Truck

Arrested Saturday night on a charge of reckless driving, Joe Meek of North Plains was bound over to the grand jury Monday afternoon and released on bail. The arrest was made at Cedar Mill by John W. Connell, sheriff.

Meek, it is charged, rounded the bend into Cedar Mill with his truck about 8 o'clock Saturday night, attempted to pass between two automobiles parked next the store and struck both of them, injuring three persons, one of them seriously.

The cars were owned by Lester J. Little and Frank L. Steffen, both of Portland. Little, 3, the injured were Ella M. Little, 38, shock and bruises, and Doris M. Little, 20, broken pelvis. Steffen suffered injuries to his hand. One car was nearly demolished, the sheriff reported.



\$12,68. The city expense was divided to make \$4750.29 for general cost, \$1316.78 for sidewalks and concrete and \$1287.70 for crushed rock for the roads.

Collections from property owners in the sidewalk project, in which the city furnishes the material and WPA labor costs, while the property owners pay back the cost to the city, has amounted to \$1945.67. A slight and collectible balance still is due the city for this work.

Progress on the sewer lines and disposal plant, as given in the budget report, show the disposal plant completed and the sewer lines 90 per cent complete. McGee recommends the completion of an industrial sewer and an additional three mains at a cost of \$12,000, which would require an additional revenue bond issue of \$7500 as provided under the original charter amendment sum of \$110,000. The remainder would be by federal grant.

Park revenues for the past nine months amounted to \$1428.28 and expenditures \$1276.75, leaving a credit balance of \$151.53. Included in this last sum is \$400 for purchase of property for new baseball field.

Uncollected taxes dating from 1921 amounts to \$16,932.13 for the general fund and \$2545.61 for the street fund. The report shows \$5975.93 still due from 1935, \$3365.39 due from 1934, \$2693.82 from 1932 and \$1661.12 from 1931.
